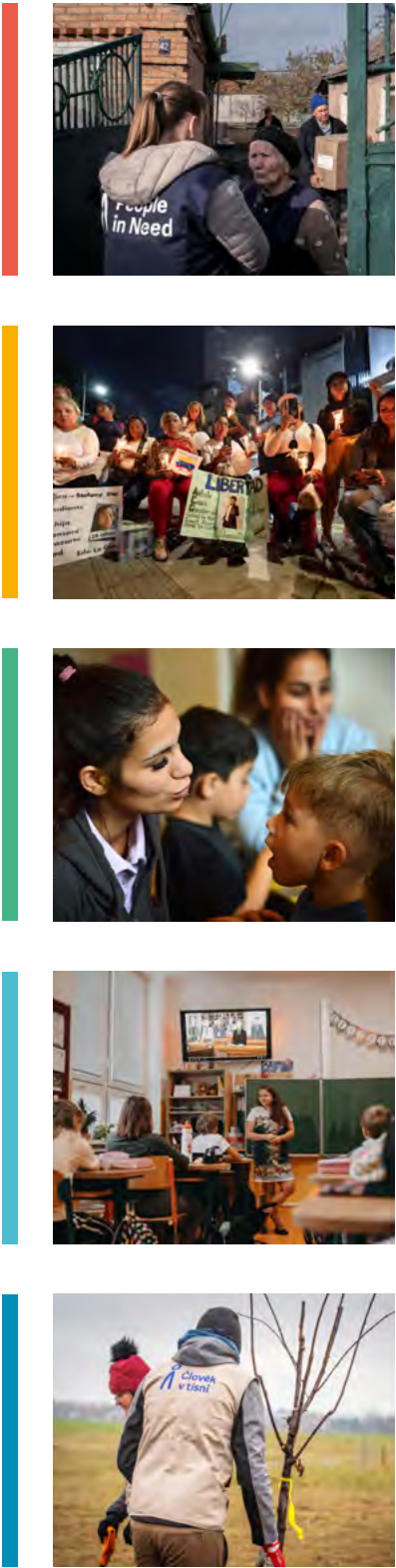

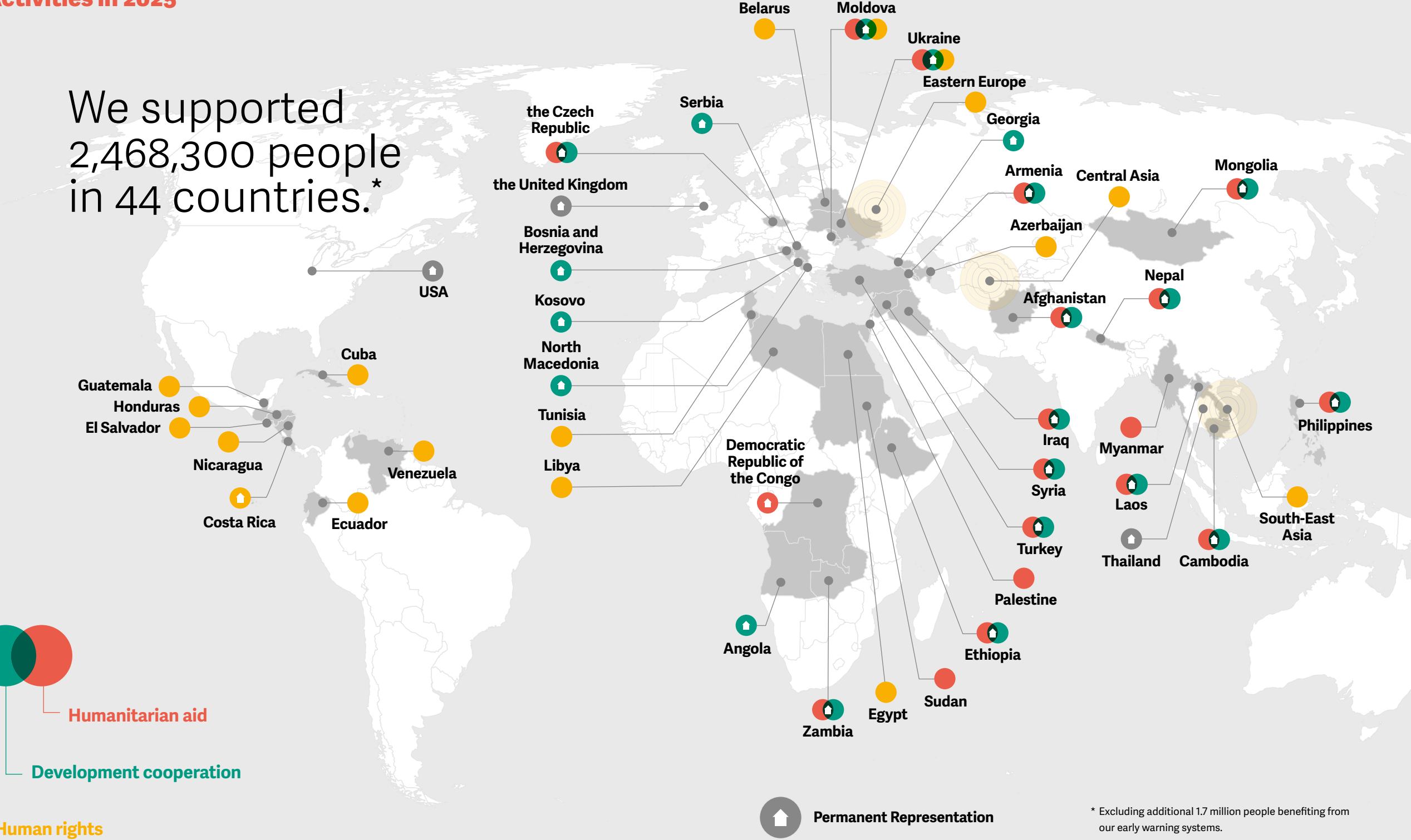
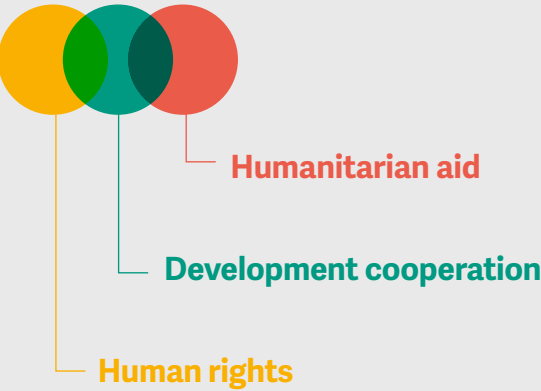

Humanitarian Aid and Development

Our Relief and Development Department supported **2,399,350** people worldwide. In addition, our early warning systems helped protect more than **1.71** million people from natural disasters.

We worked in **25** countries, with permanent offices in **21** of them.

75% of our funding was directed to vulnerable and conflict-affected countries.

A System Reset?



Even in 2025, one in ten people worldwide lived in extreme poverty, and there were 117 million forcibly displaced people—the highest number in history. In the same year, climate-related disasters affected 87 million people. People suffered and died needlessly in Gaza, Sudan, Ukraine, Democratic Republic of Congo, Myanmar, and other places. And yet many governments in wealthier countries cut their humanitarian aid development budgets. These cuts were justified in the name of greater security, even though they leave people in precarious situations and ultimately contribute to global instability.

The entire humanitarian and development system has begun to shake at its very foundations. There is less money for aid; and humanitarian mechanisms have not been reformed, instead, they have been deprived of resources, while needs grow globally. The response from world leaders is often to turn a blind eye, or even to legitimise violence and suffering, whilst downplaying global threats posed by inequality. Respect for human rights and the international order once regarded as core values of the international community, is fading. How should we respond to this? There is talk of hyper-prioritisation, of reforms, of efficiency. All of this is necessary, but it is not enough. We must look beyond the existing system. In places of crisis and disaster, we always encounter people and organisations providing aid who are not part of any official apparatus. They help quickly and at relatively low cost, even when they lack access to professional resources and systems. It is precisely these capacities that can make up for the lack of resources. Our task is not to bring local actors into our own system, but to support the work they are already leading: to pass on to them the know-how we have built up over the years and to channel financial resources from wealthier countries that they cannot access themselves. If we succeed in this, there is hope that our civilisation as a whole will not have to abandon the idea of humanism simply because it has become unachievable in its current form. We have been working in this way for several years. We invite you to judge for yourselves how successful we have been.

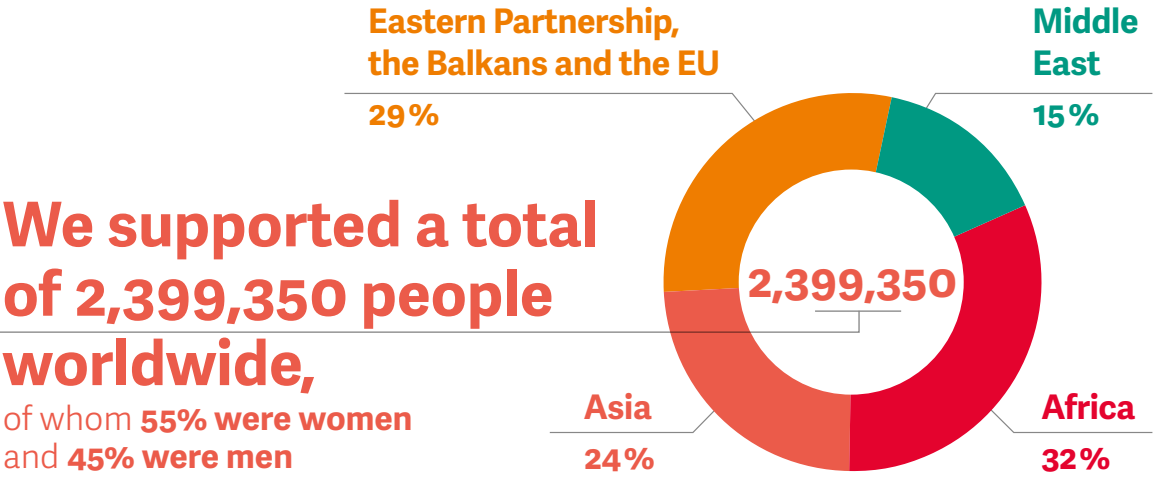

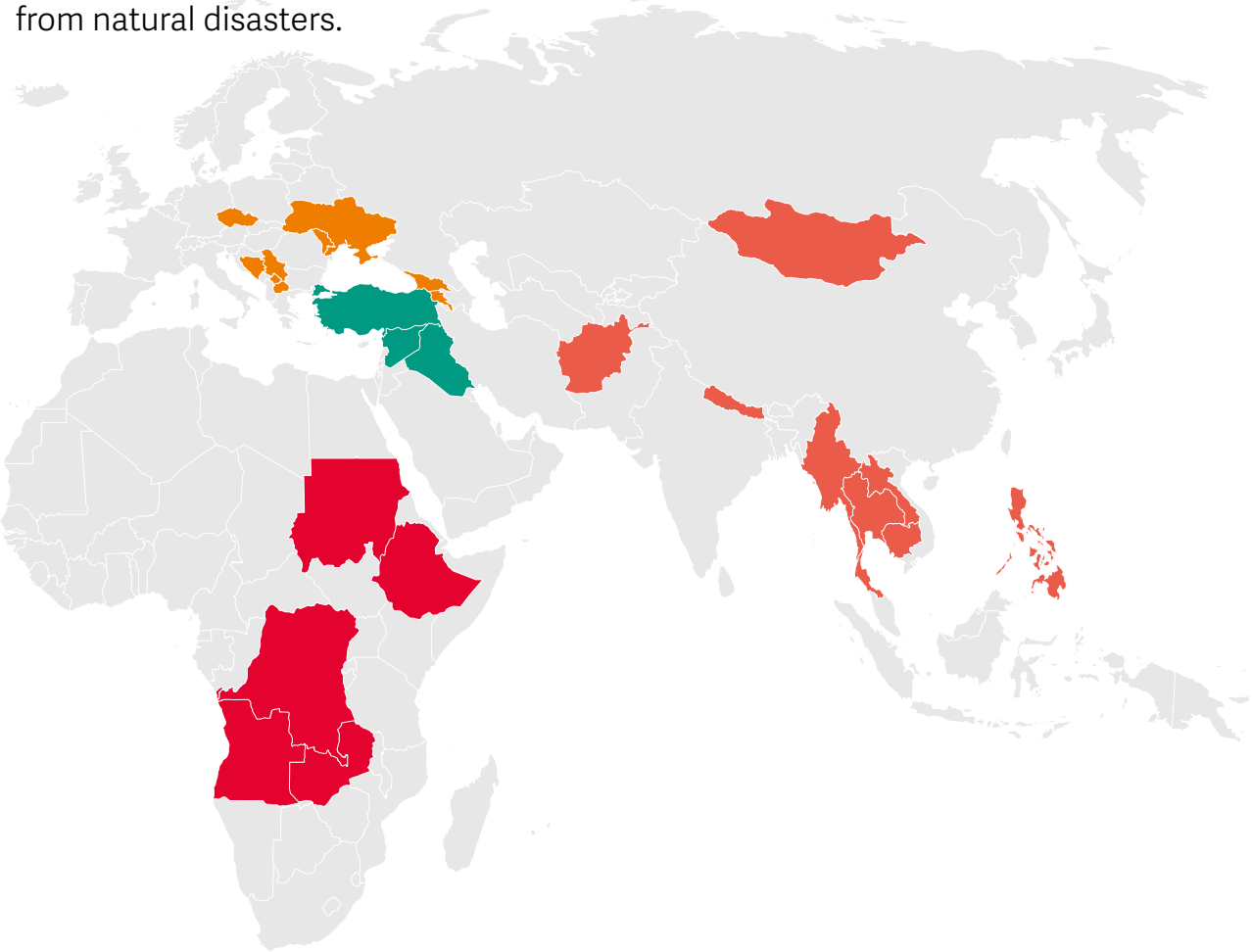

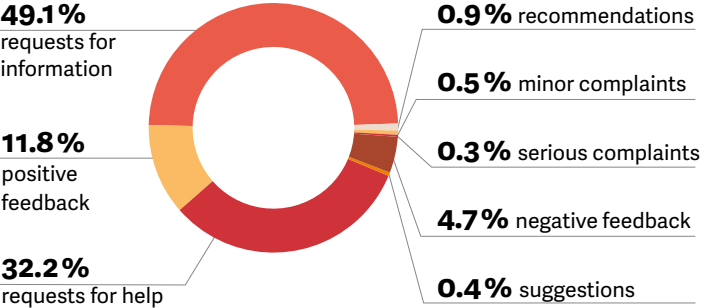

Accountability

We continued operating a feedback system to strengthen accountability and ensure that communities, partners, and other stakeholders can safely share feedback, concerns, or complaints related to our work. This system is designed to be inclusive, confidential, and context-specific. The feedback mechanism enables communities to raise issues through multiple channels and ensures that all feedback is systematically recorded, analysed, and addressed. By closing the feedback loop and communicating outcomes to complainants whenever possible, the system supports continuous learning, helps detect risks or misuse of power, and contributes to improving the quality,

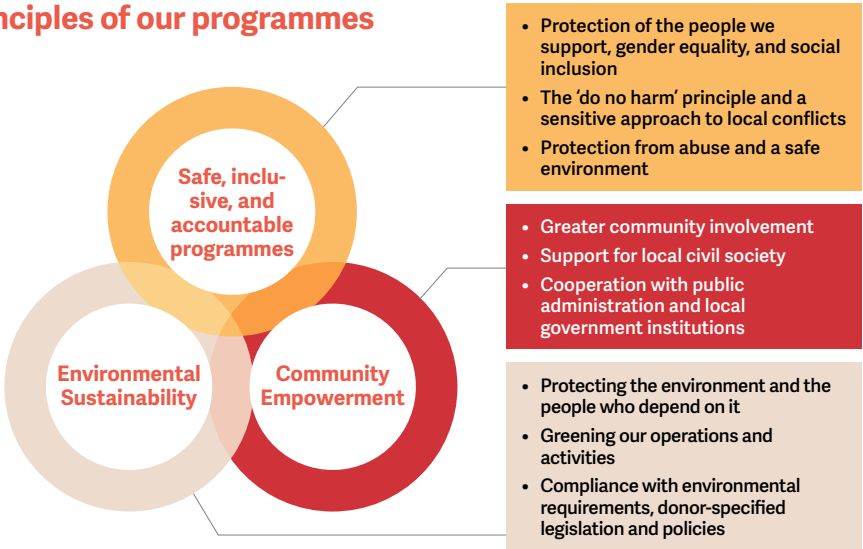
transparency, and integrity of our programmes.

In 2025, we began transitioning the feedback system into a comprehensive information management platform that will significantly strengthen how we manage feedback data by enhancing data security, structure, accessibility, and analytic capabilities.

Through our Community Feedback and Response Mechanism (CFRM) channels, over 77,000 people reached out. The majority of these interactions involved requests for assistance for information. Additionally, more than 9,000 individuals used the system to express appreciation for our work, provide constructive suggestions, or propose new initiatives.

The key quality principles of our programmes

Across all our programmes, we apply principles and standards that ensure quality and accountability are embedded in every stage of our work. This ranges from the design of activities and the identification of potential risks through to the implementation and completion of a project.

Partnerships

Throughout 2025, we strengthened and diversified our approach to partnerships. We updated our policy on funding partner organisations' core costs, extending this support to any organisation receiving funds from us, regardless of size. Our Duty of Care framework was refined to better protect partner staff working in volatile contexts. And we began sharing partner assessments with other international organisations, thus reducing the administrative burden on partners that would otherwise need to undergo repetitive evaluations.

We further strengthened the representation of CSOs in coordination with bodies and advocacy platforms, ensuring their voices shape response strategies. We continued partnerships in which national organisations lead consortia whilst PIN contributes technical expertise—an approach that places local actors in decision-making roles.

Recognising local civil society is often the first responder in times of crisis, in 2026 we will step up our support to local responders.

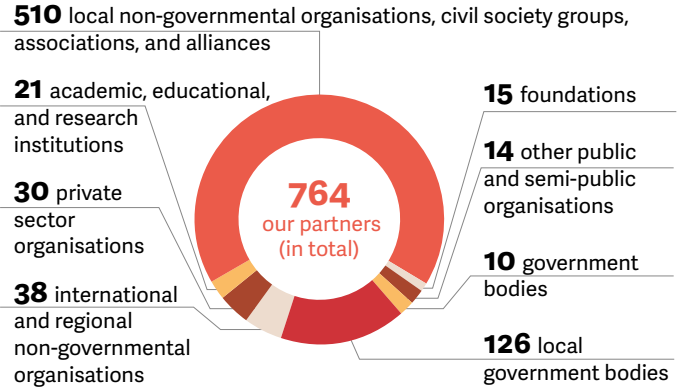
Would you work with People in Need again?



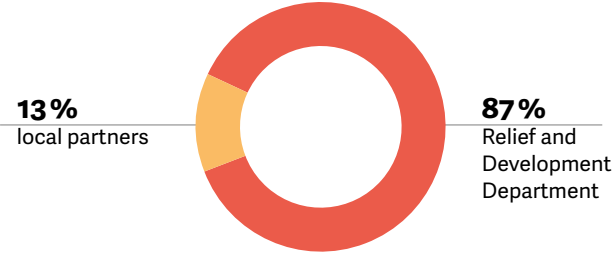
Would you recommend that other organisations work with People in Need?



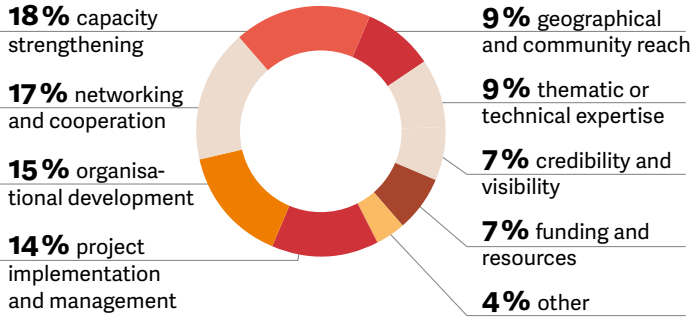

Effective Digitalisation in Practice

We strengthened our digital capacity by consolidating technology development within our in-house Digital Unit. By reducing reliance on external providers, we significantly lowered costs while increasing reliability, quality, and long-term sustainability of our solutions.

Our internally managed systems supported both humanitarian response and development programming. The Humansis platform enabled the distribution of € 1.82 million in cash assistance in Syria. We delivered new tools, including a wildfire early warning dashboard in Bosnia and a water infrastructure reporting system in Ethiopia. At the same time, we streamlined

our internal digital ecosystem by consolidating platforms, removing redundant tools, and clarifying data flows. We implemented ActivityInfo as a central system for programme activities, beneficiaries and case management, strengthened cybersecurity by achieving Cyber Essentials+ certification, and advanced responsible digitalisation through the adoption of an

organisational AI policy and staff capacity building.

In 2025, we joined NetHope, a global consortium of leading NGOs working together to strengthen digital transformation across the humanitarian sector—sharing expertise, co-developing solutions, and scaling proven approaches to increase the efficiency of aid delivery.

Finally, we designed our first RDD Digital Transformation Strategy with our country programmes, setting a clear vision, priorities, and principles for the next three years.

Conflict and disaster response: our support continues

In 2025, 3.5 % of the world population—that is every 29th person—required humanitarian assistance. While the numbers of people affected by conflicts and natural disasters continued to grow, the ability of humanitarian actors to respond has been massively constrained. It is not only about the funding cuts—we have been working in the environment of eroding norms, breaches of the International humanitarian law and impunity for their violations, and increasingly difficult access. In many countries, we have witnessed attacks on schools, hospitals, and civilian infrastructure, human-induced famine, and violence against

civilians. Despite this, we provided life-saving assistance in major crises such as Gaza, Sudan, Ukraine, and the DR Congo, often operating in hard-to-reach areas together with a growing network of both national and international partners. Our work is people-centered and focuses on protection of the marginalised and most vulnerable, particularly children in conflict settings and their access to education and mental wellbeing. We apply a multisectoral, area-based and cash-based approach to address needs holistically, while strengthening local preparedness to reduce the impact of recurrent climate shocks or conflict-related displacement.

We provided cash assistance worth € 30.6 million to 289,907 people.

We supported 811,968 people to be better prepared for crises and act ahead.

11% of our humanitarian aid was delivered in partnership with 93 local organisations.

In **Europe**, the bulk of our humanitarian aid continued to be directed towards **Ukraine**, where humanitarian needs were intensifying not only along the front line but also in major regional centres. Attacks on civilians, damage to energy and water infrastructure, and ongoing evacuations from threatened areas made life significantly more difficult for hundreds of thousands of people. In collaboration with local partner organisations and authorities, we provided emergency aid to Internally displaced persons (IDPs), supported access to essential services, and, at the same time, invested in rebuilding affected areas. We helped evacuate civilians from conflict-affected areas and provided them with immediate assistance; supported households cut off from water and electricity; repaired water supply and heating systems; and piloted hybrid solar and wind power systems to strengthen energy self-sufficiency. Thanks to cash assistance, people could meet their own needs, and our 24-hour helpline offering psychosocial support became one of the most widely used in Ukraine. We helped repair damaged homes, hospitals and

schools, including air-raid shelters, and enabled children to continue their education, integrated with psychosocial support and individualised assistance. We helped displaced people and veterans rebuild their livelihoods and regain economic self-sufficiency. In **Moldova**, we provided individualised protection support to Ukrainian refugees and vulnerable local residents, including cash assistance to help cover electricity and heating costs; we repaired and equipped schools and enabled children to continue their education while providing school meals and warm winter clothing. In **Armenia**, we organised leisure activities for children from refugee families from Nagorno-Karabakh, and their families received livelihood and housing support. In flood-prone areas, we also supported the establishment of an early warning system and improved community preparedness. In **Bosnia and Herzegovina**, we strengthened the early warning system for forest fires by providing drones and improving coordination. We also supported local fire brigades responding to wildfires around Mostar.

We delivered **642,856** monthly food rations, and **368,217** children and mothers accessed malnutrition prevention and treatment.

We supported education for **184,197** children in **417** schools and learning centres.

We provided psychosocial support and protection to **124,295** children and adults.

The Middle East, remained one of the world's most complex regions, shaped by conflicts, political transitions and instability. Despite the change of government, Syria remained in major crisis due to renewed fighting, worst drought in four decades and the challenges with return of millions of Syrians to their devastated country. In the most affected areas, we assisted newly displaced families with immediate support, provided cash-based assistance to cover urgent needs, or access safe water and sanitation. We helped to rehabilitate homes, offered quality education and psychosocial support for children, nutrition-sensitive food aid, and seasonal winterisation support. Amidst the devastating wildfires in Latakia, we supported local fire brigades. In Gaza, the crisis persisted amid widespread death, destruction, deprivation, and severe food insecurity growing into famine. Although aid access improved after the cease-fire, the blockade and border closures continued to hinder the humanitarian response. Through our partners, we supported malnutrition prevention and

treatment, water trucking and improved sanitation, and provided psychological first aid for children and their families. In Iraq, we offered children quality education and psychosocial support. Humanitarian needs remained severe across Africa as civil wars and climate-induced shocks continued to strain local communities. In the DR Congo, escalating violence caused mass displacement and deepened already severe needs, with nearly half of children chronically malnourished and one in four Congolese acutely food insecure. In response, we reached displaced people in hard-to-access, conflict-affected areas of South Kivu with immediate food assistance, malnutrition prevention and treatment, and improved health care and access to water or sanitation. In Ethiopia, recurrent drought and erratic rainfall have wiped out harvests and fighting has displaced millions. In the hardest-hit areas of Amhara, Oromia, and Tigray, we provided cash support to cover immediate basic needs, access to water and sanitation including after devastating

floods, repaired schools, and delivered quality education for children. We also provided livelihood support. The world's largest displacement and humanitarian disaster continued in Sudan, where we supported a local partner organisation in providing critical access to water and sanitation at the displacement sites in the Red Sea state. In Zambia, we continued to provide essential malnutrition prevention and treatment to communities impacted by El Niño-driven drought, alongside livelihoods support. In Asia, humanitarian needs were driven namely by recurrent climate shocks and structural vulnerabilities. Afghanistan also faced large-scale returnee inflow and severe protection risks, especially for women and girls. In response, we provided cash assistance to help families to buy food, medicines, warm clothing, or repair damaged homes. We worked with communities to build wells, pipelines or traditional water channels and latrines, repaired schools, and supported community classes, primarily serving girls. We also helped families to establish kitchen

gardens, poultry farms, and other forms of livelihood support to lift them from poverty. In Nepal, we delivered immediate or early assistance during floods, landslides, heatwaves and droughts, and hundreds of thousands of people are better able to protect their lives and livelihoods thanks to the established early warning system. In Cambodia, we provided cash, shelter and material support to the people affected by the border dispute with Thailand. We also supported preparedness and early warning systems related to floods. In the Philippines, our work centred on anticipatory action related namely to floods, enabling tens of thousands of people to act early before emergencies unfold. In Mongolia, we strengthened preparedness for steppe fires by providing equipment and safety gear to herder communities and local authorities, capacity building, and the development of early triggers. In the flood affected areas of Laos, we enhanced readiness and early warning systems, and delivered food to affected families.

Landslide Risk Reduction in Nepal

Preparedness, early warning, and anticipatory action are important parts of our work, helping communities to act earlier and reduce the impact of recurrent shocks. This is increasingly important as climate-related hazards become globally more frequent and severe. In landslide-prone hill districts of Nepal, communities face recurring monsoon-triggered failures of mountain slopes that destroy homes, roads, and threaten lives. We have worked with local authorities and village level volunteers to strengthen preparedness and anticipatory action: together with communities, we mapped landslide-prone areas, stabilised slopes, cleared drainage canals, and identified safe escape roads.

When heavy rain forecasts and observed ground movement indicators cross predefined thresholds, an anticipatory action protocol is triggered: high risk households are encouraged to evacuate, emergency evacuation sites are pre prepared, and supplies are pre positioned. We have also explored small scale cash based interventions to support relocation of people and livestock, and to protect critical assets such as food stocks and seeds. These measures have helped reduce casualties and displacement during recent landslide prone monsoon seasons. Beyond landslides, our preparedness work has expanded to other hazards the Nepali communities recurrently face: floods, heat, cold waves, and droughts.

Our assistance to children in conflict zones and crisis areas



Children are among the most vulnerable victims of armed conflict and natural disasters. The loss of safety, prolonged stress, the loss of their homes, schools and other sources of stability, as well as malnutrition and limited access to healthcare, have a profound impact on their physical and psychological wellbeing. Supporting children is not only an immediate response to crisis—it is also an investment in their future.

That is why children are at the heart of our humanitarian work. One of our main objectives is to ensure that children receive a high-quality, uninterrupted education. School is both a place to learn, and a safe space that fosters social bonds, provides stability, and supports healthy development and wellbeing. To learn, children need safety and to have their basic needs met. We combine various forms of support that complement

one another and comprehensively address children's needs. Alongside education, we also provide drinking water, psychosocial support, and safeguard children from abuse. We also support families and communities to create conditions in which children can grow up in a safer environment and with greater opportunities for the future. In 2025, we assisted 425,000 children through this support.

In Idlib, Syria, returnee children attend our learning centres where, they catch up on Arabic lessons so that they can join regular classes. To ensure sustainability, the curriculum was developed in collaboration with the Syrian Ministry of Education.

In Khan Younis, in the south of Gaza, we provide psychosocial support to help children heal from the impacts of war. Recreational activities help children rediscover a sense of safety, joy, and a normal childhood.



Winterisation Winter clothing • Heating in schools

In Wardak Province, Afghanistan, we ensure children stay warm during the freezing winters. We supported 150 community-based schools with small local bukhari stoves and firewood, and provided 5,250 children with warm winter clothing and shoes.

Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Repairs to latrines and hand washing stations in schools • Provision of safe drinking water • Hygiene supplies • Hygiene awareness, including menstrual hygiene

In Ethiopia's Tigray region, we have repaired war-damaged schools, including latrines and hand washing stations, enabling children to practice good hygiene. As a result, girls no longer fear attending school, even whilst menstruating.



Malnutrition and food security Screening and treatment of acute nutrition • Food aid for families at risk of malnutrition • School meals

In South Kivu, Democratic Republic of the Congo, one-in-two children suffers from chronic malnutrition. We train healthcare workers, and screen and treat children as needed. We also educate parents and organise practical cooking demonstrations for them.

Climate
resilience

We build resilience to climate change through local measures and strategies which, alongside addressing immediate needs, also strengthen new approaches, natural resources, livelihoods, and entire communities.

Reaching those most impacted by climate risks, especially in fragile contexts.

As the global climate crisis intensifies, its impacts are felt most acutely in countries already struggling with conflict, fragility, and economic challenges. In these contexts, climate-related disasters are catalysing increased food insecurity, displacement, and inequality. Yet, these same communities are not passive victims. They are organising, innovating, and leading local solutions from restoring degraded lands and managing scarce water resources, to rebuilding livelihoods through climate-resilient farming and collective action. With modest but sustained support, these efforts can be scaled to transform entire ecosystems and economies.



Agriculture Systems Adaptation Programme in Ethiopia

Two supported projects were concluded in Halaba and Hambaricho, focused on the resilience of local farmers to climate change and the resulting risks to farming, soil, and landslides. A unique combination of Czech and Ethiopian expertise increased know-how on geohazards, soil infiltration, changing seasonal dynamics, landscape planning, and good agriculture practices. Research results also validated modern crop processing and sustainable land management, while enhancing food security for at-risk households and schools, directly supporting 440 model farmers, 325 technicians, 12 schools,

Community-Driven Microloan Initiative in Syria

Through this pilot initiative, we support households with small, flexible loans managed directly by community structures. We provide conditional seed funding to four Self-Help Groups, where members work collectively to identify needs, manage funds, and ensure transparent lending. Each group takes full responsibility for handling, distributing, and recovering the microloans. This model strengthens financial inclusion and enables families to invest in livelihood activities and

contribute to their post-conflict economic recovery.

The AGRARIA project enhances climate resilience in Afghanistan

The initiative strengthened food security through the distribution of certified summer wheat seeds and livelihood kits to 285 women-headed households. A core focus was on sustainable water management, achieved by rehabilitating 187 wells, 10 karezes, and 13 irrigation canals in the Ghazni Province, alongside restoring 12.9km of canals and 60 water points in Herat. Furthermore, the project addresses environmental risks through disaster risk reduction planning, the planting of 10,000 trees to mitigate flooding and soil erosion, and the establishment of 65 Water User Groups.

Improved early warning systems protect more than **1.71 million people**. To ensure maximum protection, we disseminate warnings in many ways: automated voice messages, text messages, sirens, sign language videos, and community groups through messaging apps.

Smarter Warning, Faster Action

Protecting people from floods, storms, landslides, and lightning is not about one siren or a short-term project. With early warning systems, we are committed to making the whole warning chain work—from data collection and interpretation to evacuation decisions and reaching the most at-risk. When every link is connected, our warnings turn information into action. We are closing gaps in Disaster Risk Management (DRM) and Early Warning Systems (EWS).

Forecasting the floods up to 14 days ahead
In **Cambodia**, our national EWS 1294 for floods now connects nearly 1 million people to early warning and risk information. By linking the early warning system with the national social protection system ID Poor, the government can now reach those who are most at-risk. Thanks to our cooperation with private actors such as Google and their Flood Hub, we provide forecasts up to 14 days ahead of a flood.

In **Laos**, our EWS 1393 system is celebrating success with an ongoing national scale-up covering 33 districts across 9 provinces, with 50,000 people registered for warning and risk information. We are focusing on floods and utilising a variety of dissemination channels according to needs.

We also work in **Armenia**, where over 24,000 people in the Vayots Dzor and Syunik regions now benefit from enhanced early warning siren coverage, functional DRM mechanisms, and strengthened community preparedness.

Tackling wildfires and lightning strikes
In **Bosnia and Herzegovina**, we continue to combat and prepare for wildfires, supporting civil protection, frontline firefighters, and mountain rescuers in Herzegovina-Neretva Canton with a variety of tools, ranging from a comprehensive dashboard displaying relevant data on wildfires to an SMS function allowing them to quickly contact their team or even communities.

In **Nepal**, through the UKAID funded RAIN programme, we work with both government and communities to enhance early warning, early action, and adaptation through the installation of hydrometeorological stations, inclusive dissemination mechanisms, and increased community response capacities, in line with Locally Led Adaptation principles.

In partnership with the South Asian Lightning Network we piloted a community-based **lightning early warning system** in the Makawanpur district. Covering 18,000 people living in the area. Atmospheric sensors detect dangerous weather conditions and provide up to 15 minutes of warning time through simple sirens and signal lights, helping people to move to safer places before strikes occur.

Early warning systems: From data analysis to saving lives

Rather than passively waiting for a disaster to strike, early warning systems enable people to identify impending dangers in advance. Thanks to timely warnings, residents can protect their lives, property, and livelihoods.



Detection – risk monitoring
Floods and other threats are regularly monitored using sensors, satellite data, and digital maps. By combining modern technologies with local knowledge, we can identify and assess the level of risk for a specific location in advance.

Warning – timely and clear communication
As soon as the system detects a threat, local authorities and trained personnel assess the level of danger and prepare warning messages. These are then disseminated in a coordinated manner through various channels to ensure they reach at-risk communities in advance.

Action – effective measures
Warnings are delivered via various methods (voice messages, SMS, phone calls, radio, apps, and sirens) to ensure residents have a clear understanding of the extent of a threat and instructions on how to proceed. Thanks to this timely information, people can evacuate to safety in advance and safeguard their lives, homes, and livelihoods

Local Voices, Lasting
Change: Civil Society for
Inclusive Development

Democracy with an active civil society delivers tangible benefits in everyday life. When civil society is engaged, government policies and infrastructure investments are more likely to be well designed and to generate lasting benefits for all. We support civil society across its many roles—service provider, innovator, watchdog, and advocate—to help build healthy democracies that works for their people.

Digital Inclusion in Mongolia

Mongolia’s shift toward becoming a “Digital Nation” is opening up new opportunities for citizens—from easier access to public services to greater participation in democratic

processes. However, it also risks leaving behind marginalised communities, who often have limited access to technology and low levels of digital literacy. Civil society can play an important role in closing this gap.

Through the “Digital Inclusion through CSO Empowerment” (DICE) project, implemented with our Mongolian partner, Faro Foundation, we supported civil society organisations (CSOs) in building digital literacy among marginalised groups. We began by strengthening the organisations’ own digital capacities, then provided funding and mentoring so they could run their own initiatives.

For example, the Mongolian Artisanal Mining Umbrella Federation trained women and men working in artisanal mining in practical digital skills they could use in their daily lives and work. This included preparing contract documentation, accessing data on disturbed land, and learning how to apply for land permits through the Mineral Resources Authority’s website. After the training, participants were able to use the government’s E-Mongolia platform to obtain certificates and tax documents. They also learned basic email skills, allowing them to submit contracts, reports, and other documents online.

Better Nutrition Through Sustainable
Change in Angola

Angola continues to face high levels of malnutrition, especially chronic malnutrition and anaemia among women and children. Addressing this requires long-term interventions. Rather than providing short-term aid, we focus on strengthening the capacity of local

CSOs and public authorities to plan, deliver, and monitor improved nutrition services that last.

Through our “Civil Society for Nutrition” project, implemented with our Angolan partner, ADESPOV, we supported local CSOs with funding to run initiatives that improve both food production and nutrition. These included family, community, and school gardens, stronger local seed systems, and practical nutrition education using locally available foods.

For example, Grupo Comitiva set up a 9,100 m² community garden, growing crops such as cabbage, onion, pigeon pea, beetroot, and aubergine, increasing access to nutritious food. CSOs also ran cooking sessions and awareness activities to promote balanced diets, alongside training on soil preparation, water use, and efficient farming methods. Rainwater harvesting and safe water practices further supported food production and preparation.

All initiatives aligned with municipal nutrition action plans developed through participatory processes led by Nutrition Advisory Committees. Comprising local authorities, civil society, service providers, and communities, these committees work to ensure initiatives will be sustained using available financial resources.

Strengthening Community Social Services in Armenia

In Armenia’s Syunik region, many people still lack access to consistent, quality social services. Through the “Partnership for Syunik: Enhanced Community-based Social Services” project, we worked to change this by strengthening cooperation between civil society and government and shifting from short-term assistance to sustainable, needs-based support.

A new coordination mechanism—Municipal Social Commissions—brings together local authorities and civil society actors to jointly assess

needs and plan sustainable local services.

With € 700,000 in sub-grants, we supported local CSOs to become effective service providers and partners to municipalities. Services piloted included social taxi services for people with limited mobility, home and day care for older persons and children, temporary shelters, housing accessibility improvements, and reintegration support for at-risk groups such as those leaving prison or families living in poverty.

At the same time, we worked with the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs to advance reforms promoting community-based care. These efforts helped pilot new models of service delivery with direct engagement and funding from municipalities. Five pilot services have already been accredited and CSOs continue providing them through state funding.

These three projects are funded by the EU.

Inclusive development along the Lobito Corridor

The Lobito Corridor, one of the EU’s flagship projects under the Global Gateway initiative, is designed to connect global markets with Angola, Zambia, and Democratic Republic of the Congo. However, without strong involvement from local communities, such a large-scale infrastructure project may fail to bring any benefits to the people living along its route. To ensure that local residents do not become passive recipients of these investments, we launched the Corridor Voices initiative in November 2025. In all three countries, we are connecting civil society with investors, local businesses, and local authorities. People should be given the space, sufficient information, and the influence needed to participate actively

in key decision-making. In this way, we are striving to ensure benefits for local communities, from monitoring environmental impacts to supporting women and young entrepreneurs in integrating into new value chains.

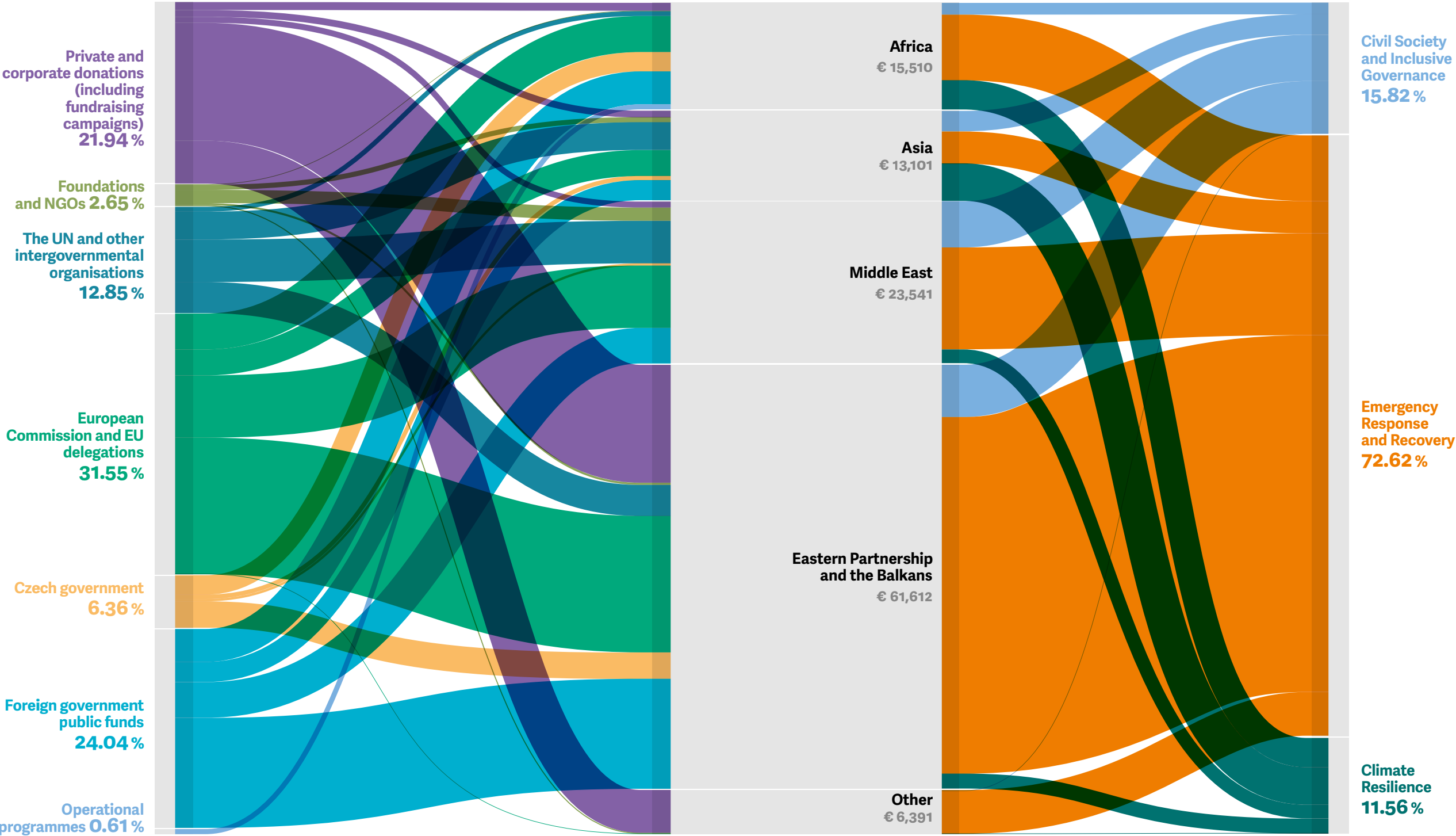

How does
authoritarianism begin
and democracy end?



I should write about what 2025 meant for our Centre for Human Rights and Democracy and our partner organisations, which work courageously in countries where freedom and democracy are lacking.

Lately, however, we have not been measuring our work in years, but in crises. The world is becoming increasingly dangerous and unpredictable. Amongst others, human rights activists, independent journalists, and an active civil society are on the front line. Not only in times of war and natural disaster, but also during major social upheavals.

Being active also means becoming a target for those who resent social solidarity and independent institutions.

The first task in isolating civil society is achieved through labelling and propaganda. Then come the restrictions, from funding cuts to attempts to complicate or prevent the work of human rights activists and organisations. If that fails, then come persecution, trials, and imprisonment.

We see this in many countries. Over the past decade, we have supported people in a number of states where governments are persecuting civil society. We help human rights defenders to find safety, we contribute to legal services, and we co-organise advocacy campaigns within international institutions.

On many occasions, we have succeeded in contributing to real progress. That is why we know full well the value of international solidarity, and why we can quickly recognise when something is amiss in society, or when democracy is under threat.

We are already seeing signs of this, and not just in distant countries. It is spreading like a disease—quickly and effectively—until suddenly it may appear where we are too. Yet there are still compelling reasons for optimism, because there are very effective remedies against the trends I am writing about: empathy, solidarity, and support. Thank you for standing with us in this.

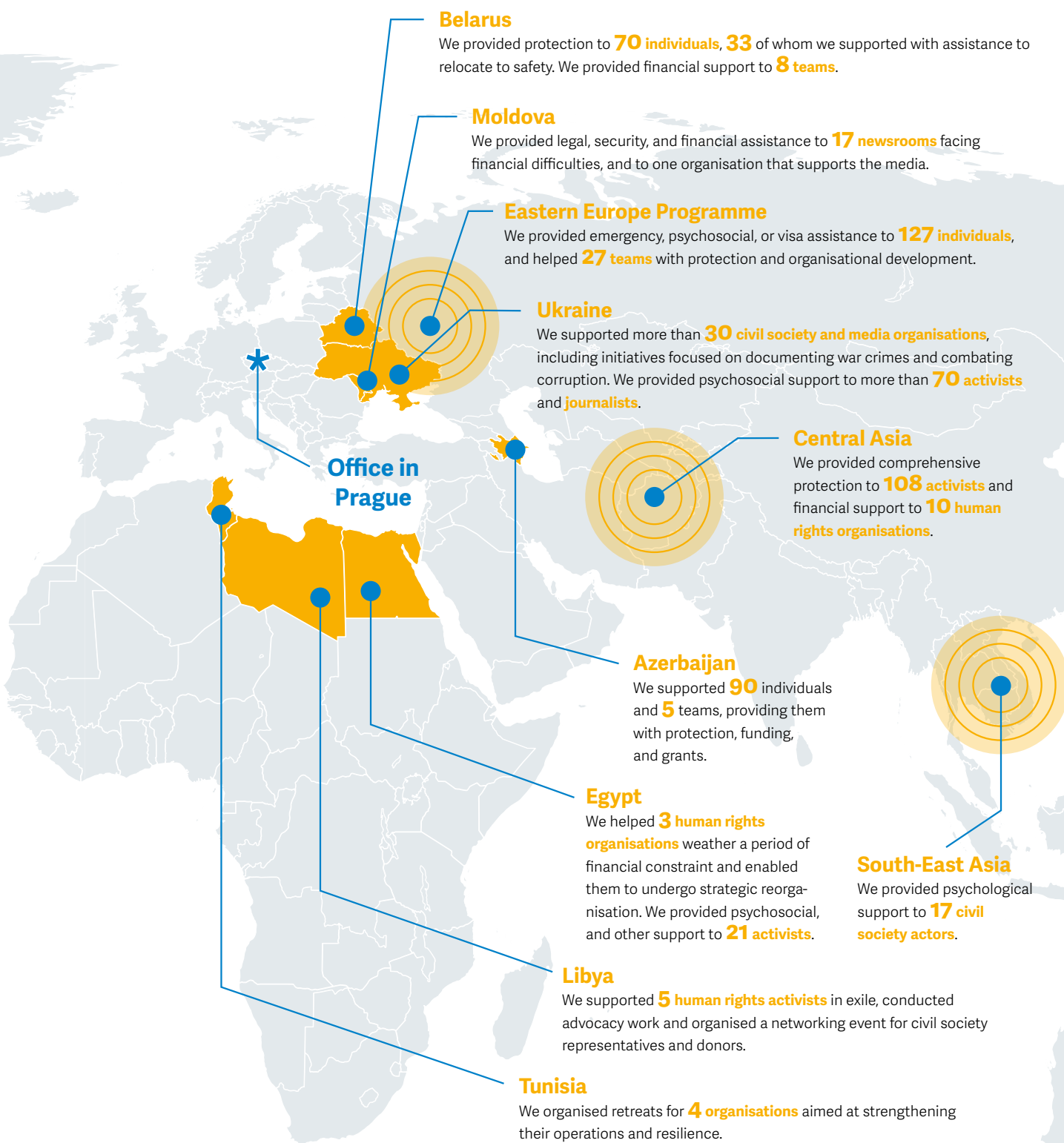
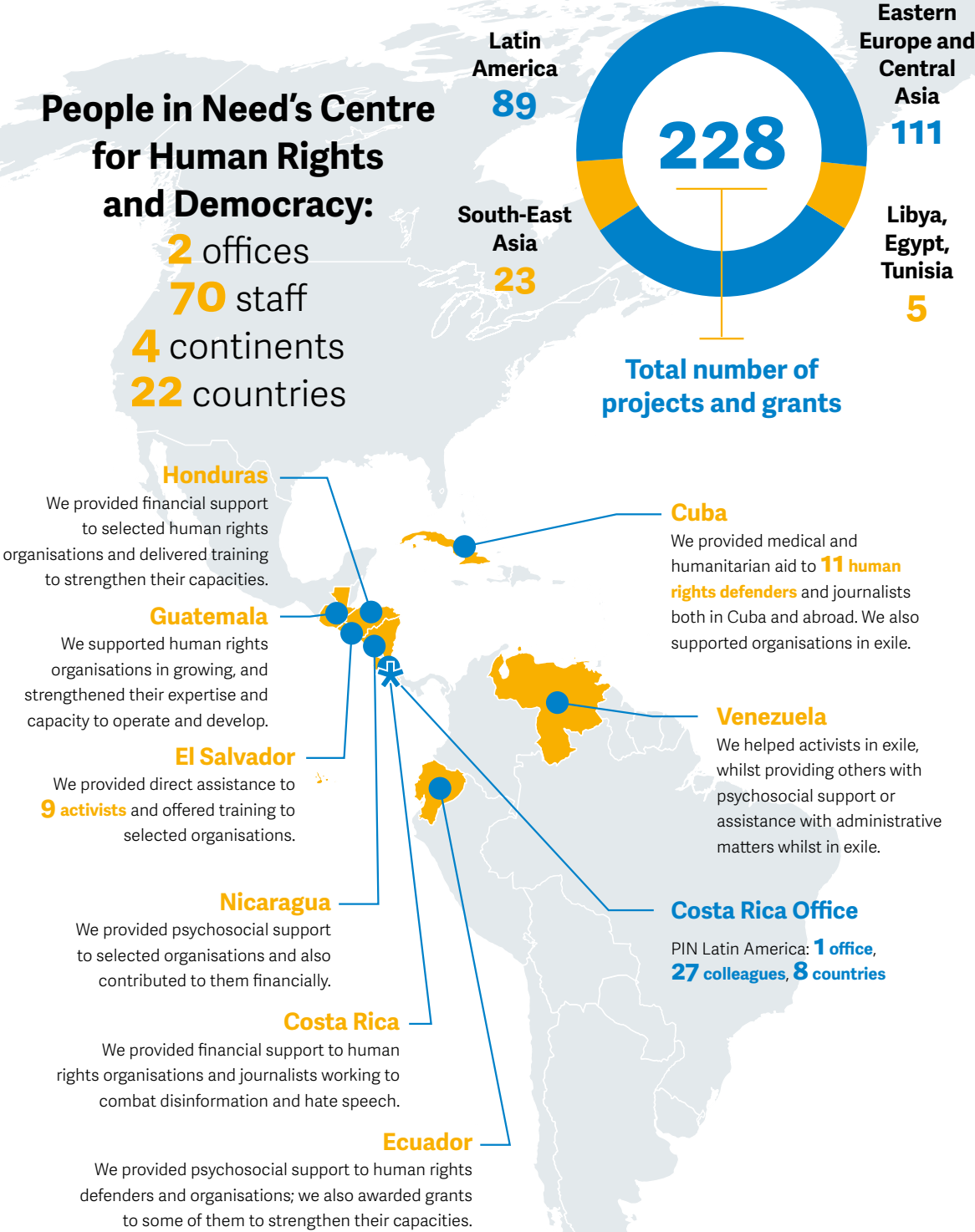

Protecting human rights defenders

In total, we provided direct protection—legal, medical, psychosocial, financial and relocation support—to **1,179 human rights defenders**, including journalists, lawyers, activists, and bloggers.

We help human rights defenders find safety

At the start of 2025, the US halted all financial aid provided by USAID. Hundreds of human rights organisations around the world lost a significant portion of their budgets; some ceased to exist, whilst others required urgent assistance. This was a severe blow to one of the pillars of human rights work: the protection of activists. Following the suspension of USAID’s activities, many organisations around the world lost the ability to provide this support. Every year, we help activists and others to reach safety, and, when necessary, to leave the country. In Latin America, for example, we helped a woman to escape across the border. She had been campaigning in her country for citizens’ right to free elections. She

fled with her children after her home was destroyed during a raid. We assist people in similar situations in certain countries in Eastern Europe and Central Asia. With authoritarian tendencies, on the rise, repression and arrests around the world, the demand for direct assistance—particularly relocation—is growing. Thanks to our donors—ordinary people, companies, and governmental institutions—we have strengthened our work in this area. In the first few months of 2025, we took on cases involving assistance for human rights defenders from organisations that were no longer able to provide support. We arranged their relocation to safety and provided subsequent support.

Strengthening the capacity of civil society

In 2025, through study visits, training courses, seminars, and organisational development we collaborated with **855 civil society actors** in our selected countries.

We are strengthening civil society, media, and human rights organisations

In Ukraine, the media has become a piece of critical infrastructure in its own right. It runs a spectrum ranging from local outlets, which report on matters such as energy supplies and shelter locations to national media, which cover political and international events. However, local media faces a whole range of obstacles: from the deterioration of finances as a result of the war, through the suspension of USAID, to Russian attacks on energy infrastructure. We know that the media is a pillar of democracy and civil society, and not just in war-torn countries. That is why we provide financial support to newsrooms through grants and organise training and workshops. In Moldova, we supported investigative

media outlets which, ahead of the 2025 parliamentary elections, exposed Russia’s attempts to influence the outcome. However, our support is by no means limited to the media. The organisations we support often work with great courage in countries where authoritarian regimes are crushing civil society and persecuting, imprisoning, and silencing pro-democracy voices. In 2025, we supported organisations that were facing financial difficulties following the cessation of US funding. We provided over 200 financial assistance grants to provide CSOs and human rights defenders with a sense of stability. At a time of growing uncertainty, it is crucial that civil society survives and continues to fulfil its role.

We provided Ukrainian media organisations with training in tactical medicine, lectures on moving safely in combat zones, emergency evacuation procedures, and risk assessments.

Homo Homini goes to Mikalai
Statkevich

Since 1994, we have been awarding the Homo Homini Award to individuals and groups who demonstrate outstanding dedication to the promotion of human rights, democracy, and non-violent resolutions to political conflicts. In 2025, we honoured Belarusian politician and activist Mikalai Statkevich, one of the most prominent figures in the opposition to Alexander Lukashenko. Statkevich's resistance has continued since the 1990s. He stood against Lukashenko in the presidential elections and organised anti-government protests, for which he was repeatedly imprisoned. In total, he has spent more than twelve years behind bars. After his release, authorities attempted to force him to leave the country. Along with other prisoners, he was

taken to the Lithuanian border and pressured to go into exile. Statkevich refused, forced his way off the bus and did not cross the border. As a result, he was returned to prison and his fourteen-year sentence was reinstated. In January 2025, he suffered a stroke. The authorities subsequently released him and he is now recovering at home. Despite imprisonment, and the violence he has endured, Mikalai Statkevich continues to defend the right of Belarusians to live in a free society.

One World in Brussels

In April, we organised the eighteenth edition of the One World in Brussels film festival. The programme featured ten films, and the screenings were complemented by discussions with filmmakers, activists, and representatives of various organisations.

Through the Homo Homini Award and at our festivals, we honour artists and human rights defenders who contribute to the protection of freedom and democracy. For people facing oppression, it is important to know that their struggle is being seen, even if it may seem hopeless.

Through the SOMOS Festival, we used film, music, and debates to explore human rights issues and connect civil society with the public. "Our programme is diverse and creates a space for important voices to be heard and for an informed and active civil society to be strengthened," said Abdul Sirker, an organiser of SOMOS.

The programme opened with topical issues relating to war, authoritarian regimes, and the curtailing of freedoms. The screening of the film No Other Land generated a strong response, followed by a discussion with one of the directors, Basel Adra. The film follows Palestinian communities in the West Bank and documents their displacement and the pressure exerted by the Israeli army. During the discussion following the film Facing War, Ukrainian activist, Maksym Butkevych, spoke alongside director Tommy Gulliksen—just a few months after his release from a Russian prison. 1,321 filmgoers attended One World in Brussels. The screenings and debates provided a space for people to meet those working on human rights at both European and international levels.

The SOMOS Festival in Costa Rica

In December, we organised the fourth edition of the SOMOS International Human Rights Festival in San José, Costa Rica. We screened 27 feature- and short-films from 12 countries and

held discussions with filmmakers, activists, and experts. The programme included a workshop in which participants produced three short documentary films. We explored themes such as forced exile, migration, historical memory, and the rights of women and LGBTQ+ people. We also organised concerts, activities for children, and meetings between various organisations. The festival reached a wide audience and created a space for people to come together to discuss human rights issues. At the close of the festival, we presented several awards. We recognised six films, as well as musical and civic projects, that contribute to the protection of human rights. The award for Best Feature-Length Documentary went to the film Water for Life, which follows various communities' struggle for access to water and the protection of natural resources. The Best Short Documentary, Más Allá de las Medallas (Beyond Medals), focuses on the personal stories of athletes and their experiences with inequality and discrimination.

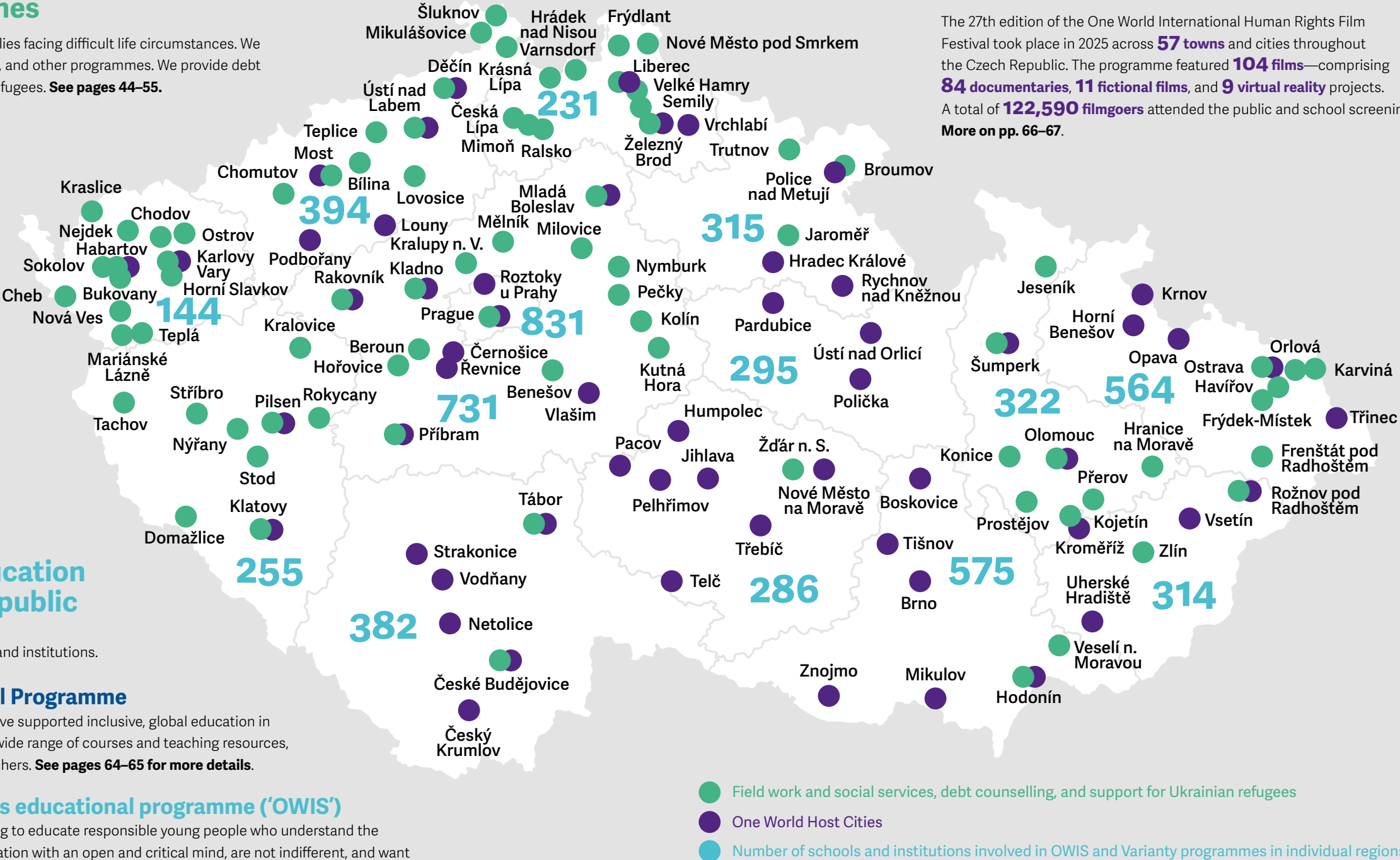

Social Work and Counselling

We provide debt counselling in **13 regions** of the Czech Republic, and social services and other programmes in **7**.

Our field, social, and debt counsellors worked on a long-term basis with more than **13,500 individuals** and families from the Czech Republic. We provided basic one-time advice on an anonymous basis to a further **25,200 people**.

20,000 people contacted our debt helpline, whilst **4,885 people** contacted the helpline for refugees. We helped a further **3,125 individuals** or families as part of our support for Ukrainian refugees.

The day-to-day work of our social activation services for families with children focuses on childcare, health, housing, finances, family relationships, school attendance, and leisure activities. Our club for mothers offers a space to break from their daily routine, share challenges, and spend quality time with their children. Photo: Tereza Benešová

support benefits us all



In 2025, our day-to-day work confirmed that an increasing number of families are living under long-term pressure, where even ordinary life situations can become a serious crisis. We meet parents who are juggling debts, insecure housing, and fears for their children’s futures. It is with these individuals and their day-to-day decisions that our work begins.

Through social, educational, legal, and material support, we help families so that they are not left to cope alone in difficult times and have a chance to manage their situation. Our experience shows that timely and accessible support benefits both the children and parents we work with, and society as a whole. Outstanding debts, unstable housing, and inequalities in education have long-term repercussions for public budgets, social cohesion, and people’s trust in the state.

Alongside direct support, we bring our team’s experience into the public debate and highlight systemic structures that prevent people in difficult situations from getting back on their feet. In 2025, it remained crucial for us to combine practical support with efforts to bring about systemic changes that give people a real chance to regain control of their lives.

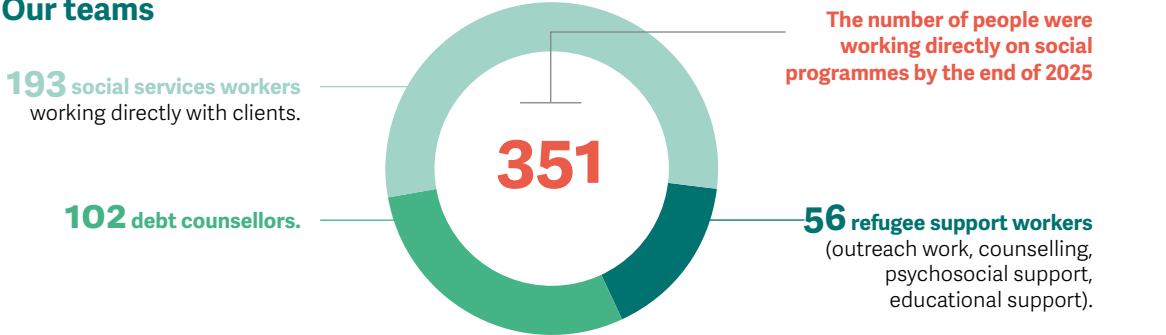

A statutory voluntary repayment plan offers protection against enforcement proceedings involving the sale of a debtor's seized property. To ensure that debtors (and, as it turned out, some enforcement officers too) were aware of this, we ran an information campaign entitled 'Help the enforcement officer comply with the law and defend your rights during enforcement proceedings against movable property'.

Debt
counselling

We supported people facing financial hardship, debt, and enforcement proceedings. We strive for fairer conditions and systemic changes, highlight risks, and expose illegal practices.

Our debt advisers provided long-term support to **9,320 people** and one-off assistance to **13,600***.

The helpline has helped **20,000 people**.



Our debt team has led the
recovery of €2 million in
overpaid loans

Lucie approached our debt advice centre when her bank account was frozen due to an old non-bank loan of € 740. She is retired, so she saw debt relief as her only way out of enforcement proceedings amounting to almost € 16,500! She visited our debt advice centre, and three months later, she owed nothing and was able to use her bank account again. She didn't even have to enter debt relief. *"Similarly, in 2025, we helped facilitate nearly 8,000 settlements of loan agreements, leading to the repayment of overpayments by creditors totalling roughly € 2 million. This eliminated unlawful charges amounting to around € 12.3 million,"* says Daniel Hůle, Head of Debt Counselling. Had this not happened, many people would have been paying off their debts for the rest of their lives. Not the principal—which in Lucie's case had already been repaid three times—but high interest and other charges.

Demand for debt counselling is growing

Our debt counselling programme is the largest specialised free service in the Czech Republic for tackling over-indebtedness.

At our debt advice centres across 13 regions of the Czech Republic, we have worked with 9,320 people on a long-term basis and provided basic one-off advice to a further 13,600 on an anonymous basis.* Our nationwide helpline (770 600 800) has supported 20,000 people, and our website, jakprezitdluhy.cz, continues to grow in reach. Interest is also growing in our video counselling service, which which—due to its effectiveness—we consider to be the service of the future. On the website, users can also try out a wide range of digital tools, such as Lichvolapka, which helps identify potentially invalid credit agreements. They can also access a debt relief income eligibility calculator. We also launched GPP, a new tool that streamlines the work of our debt counselling teams.

We help people with exorbitantly expensive or illegal loans

Dealing with unreasonably expensive or illegal non-bank loans dominates our caseload; we record five times as many such cases as applications for debt relief. For clients for whom insolvency is the only way out, our cooperation



does not end when their application for debt relief is approved; it continues until the process is complete. We continued to serve the public by publishing two Responsible Lending Indexes. In June, we published a comparison of short-term loans based on extensive analyses, and in November, a comparison of long-term loans.

We work systematically to achieve greater consumer protection

Our daily contact with the people facing overindebtedness reveals a need for systemic changes. We succeeded in helping to prevent an increase in fee rates and in securing compromise adjustments to the flat-rate reimbursements for bailiffs. This avoided a disproportionate rise in the costs of enforcement proceedings, further indebtedness, and the loss of the incentive to repay the original debt. As part of preparations for the amendment to the Consumer Credit Act in line with the European CCD2 Directive, we participated in negotiations that resulted in an agreement on the level of interest rate caps for loans. This enhances consumer protection whilst ensuring that affordable, legal loans for low-income households remain available. The Ministry of Finance has also backed down from its plan to remove any reference to intermediaries from the Act. Consumers will continue to be protected even if they borrow from another individual through a professional intermediary.

We highlighted the insidious nature of such brokered 'P2P' loans, which are often accompanied by unlawful practices, at a press conference in May. We have also continued legal proceedings against firms that deprive people in financial distress of their property.

We support adults, families, and youth

We help people in difficult life situations. We offer advice in situations where people need to keep their homes or move out of unsuitable accommodation, or who cannot afford to pay for utilities or food, or are facing unemployment, or debt enforcement. We work with children and young people and strive for systemic change.

We discussed our experiences with the Positive Behaviour Intervention and Support (PBIS) method, which we use in our low-threshold clubs for children and young people, with experts Tim Lewis, from the University of South Carolina, and Mark Weist, from the University of Missouri. Their insights made valuable contributions to our work.

2025: We grappled with unaffordable housing and the ‘super-benefit’

In 2025, unaffordable housing and the ‘super-benefit’ were the main issues raised in our outreach programmes, social activation services for families with children, and in our dealings with politicians. We worked with 4,230 individuals or families across seven regions and provided one-off counselling on an anonymous basis to a further 7,900 people.*

We are responding to current needs

In the field of mental health, we have also recently begun providing crisis support for victims of domestic violence in the Pilsen Region. We have established a system of therapeutic mental health support in five low-threshold clubs for children and young people. We have also been involved

in ministerial and regional working groups on this topic. Our Central Bohemia branch had positive experiences applying the ChildTalks+ method, which focuses on families where, for example, a parent has a psychiatric diagnosis. Likewise, they had similar experiences with the ‘Bez obav’ (Without Worries) programme, run under the auspices of the National Institute of Mental Health—this helps children suffering from anxiety with the help of their parents. We continue to maintain a team of over a hundred colleagues for emergency situations. They have been trained in psychosocial support and share their expertise with the Integrated Rescue System.

Our outreach and social workers supported 4,230 individuals and families.

A further 7,900 received basic one-off counselling anonymously*.

We provide support in difficult life situations

“Our role is to assist low-income families and individuals. Often, they tend to have lower levels of education, struggle to find work, live in unsuitable conditions, are in debt, or have suddenly found themselves in a difficult situation due to deteriorating health or the breakdown of their family,” explains Kateřina Dosoudilová, Head of Social Services.

We help people stabilise their situation so that they do not fall further into debt, lose their homes, or have their children taken into care. That is why, we helped with applications for the new ‘super-benefit’ to ensure families did not experience a loss of income. We supported 2,000 people in obtaining social benefits. We also improved digital and communication skills, helped people find work, and supported more than 1,500 individuals and families in overcoming issues relating to housing. The people who turn to us often

need coordinated care from multiple sources.

We help children and young people

As part of our family support work, we continued to develop our Step by Step intervention programme, which focuses on child development and strengthening parenting skills. In our low-threshold clubs, we continued to work with the SOFA organisation using the Positive Behavioural Interventions and Supports (PBIS) method to encourage positive behaviour among children and young people. We shared our experiences with several primary schools. We also work with young people and adults with criminal records, to help them reintegrate into society. In the Pilsen Region, we provide legal assistance to victims of crime.

We support refugees

In the Czech Republic, we support refugees who have health problems, are unable to work, or have other special needs. We help with sorting out documents, applying for humanitarian benefits, and finding accommodation, work, or doctors. We provide interpretation services and teach Czech language courses.

We help people escape the traps of illegal work, anxiety, and depression

“At the start of the war [in Ukraine], our clients often displayed symptoms of stress, shock, and instability. Now, it is more often signs of depression and anxiety about the future,” notes our psychologist, Daryna Chendoni. *“The demand for psychosocial support is increasing because, in addition to traumatic experiences, there is long-term frustration stemming from general uncertainty, livelihood difficulties, and the situation of separated families who are here,”* explains Zuzana Ramajzlová, Head of the Refugee Support Programme in the Czech Republic.

We have supported older people, carers, the sick, children, and young people.

Our psychologists have provided therapeutic support to more than 340 clients, including children, during 2,775 consultations in our offices, in the communities, and online. Every day we encounter the harrowing stories of Ukrainians driven from their homes by Russia’s invasion. We are supporting a woman who is alone in the Czech Republic, separated from her loved ones, and whose health has deteriorated to the point where she now requires palliative care. We are also supporting a mother who arrived here

whilst pregnant, accompanied by her seriously ill eight-year-old daughter.

We help with issues relating to housing, work, and health

We supported 3,125 Ukrainian refugees across eight regions, and provided basic, one-off counselling anonymously to a further 3,700 people.* We focus on older people, those who are ill, mothers with young children, young people, and those who are disadvantaged in the labour market. Four years on from Russia’s full-scale invasion, there is still a need to help new arrivals. Thus, we continue to collaborate and coordinate with other charitable organisations.

We provide advice, accompany people to government offices and healthcare facilities, and act as interpreters. Through our nationwide helpline, we provided information and dealt with enquiries from 4,885 people. In total, we provided our clients with more than 19,500 different forms of support. In particular, we addressed issues relating to residence permits, the (lack of) access to healthcare, housing, employment, and financial circumstances.

We are intensively tackling labour exploitation

Over the past four years, a large proportion of Ukrainian adults have successfully integrated into the legal labour market, and their contribution to the state’s revenue from taxes and social security has long since exceeded, by double, the expenditure on supporting them. However, a large proportion are still working below their qualifications. We help with the recognition of foreign qualifications and, at the same time, are intensively tackling the rampant issue of labour exploitation. *“We come across many cases where Ukrainian refugees find themselves trapped in illegal employment— they are not paid, they work in truly difficult conditions, and without a legal contract. We are helping them overcome these issues,”* says Zuzana Ramajzlová.

We are involved in resolving major breaches of labour law. Our analysis, The Pitfalls of Labour Law, highlights loopholes in the legislation and the practices of employers who exploit them. In the autumn, following the tragic death of a young boy named Ivan, we called on companies to review their recruitment procedures. We are striving for more effective systemic solutions.

We provided tutoring and helped with school selection

To ensure that Ukrainian children and young people are better prepared for their future, we support their education. By providing tuition and helping choose schools, and preparing for entrance or school-leaving exams, we supported 875 people, 590 of whom were children or young people.

In 2025, we supported the education of **2,200+** children and young people.

We conducted **286** seminars, webinars, and meetings as part of courses for teachers, parents, and children.

4,410+ attendances of our educational events for teachers, students, and others.

Over **173,000** lesson views were recorded on the JSNS.CZ educational portal, along with more than **137,000** downloads of teaching materials.

122,590 filmgoers attended One World screenings in **57** towns and cities, including school screenings.



We support equal opportunities in education, active citizenship, and an informed society.

In 2025, we focused more of our efforts on supporting primary school teachers. We prepared teaching resources on modern history, which we tested with pupils at Kapitán Jasiok Primary School in Havířov before we published them on the JSNS.CZ portal.

Opportunities for all children



‘Educational inequalities’ has been a common phrase in debates about the Czech education system for some time now. For over two decades we have been monitoring how local councils, councillors, and political parties change in dozens of municipalities, yet educational inequalities persist, if not actually worsen. Decisions on key aspects of education in the Czech Republic are taken locally, and the idea of making schools less selective is hardly a vote winner. For many years, we have argued that unless some decision-making is transferred to the state, fundamental change will not take place. We would like to conclude the third decade of our work with schools, parents, and children knowing that the Ministry of Education is capable of implementing a fair education system. One, in which the quality of education does not depend on which region or town you live in, or which school you manage to get your child into. Where prospects are not determined by a parents’ level of education. This is important for the children themselves, because education should give every child the chance to lead a fulfilling life. But it is also important for all of us—can you think of a better investment for a resilient and stable society?

We must not give in to evil



Through ‘Stories of Injustice’, I met former political prisoners—men and women who showed tremendous courage in the fight against communism. During our meetings, I marvelled at how, despite their difficult lives, they had retained their hope and optimism. At the same time, I realised time-and-again that we must not allow their legacies to be forgotten. That has been the mission of our educational project, which, for the past 20 years, has focused on teaching Czechoslovak history. Nowadays, when so much of our recent past is being distorted and relativised, when one feels ashamed of the behaviour and actions of certain politicians and public figures, I often think of these brave people. I ask myself how they would react in the current situation. Of course, I do not know exactly what they would say, but the message would certainly be that we must not give in to evil—that freedom, democracy, and human rights must be defended, and that we must not abdicate our personal responsibility or passively accept the unpleasant things happening around us.

We help children and adolescents, and support schools as well as active citizens



For the general public

- We organise **information campaigns** on migration, human rights, modern Czechoslovak history, media literacy, and climate education.
- We organise the **One World Film Festival**.
- We run **exhibitions and public film screenings** on various topics, including the Stories of Injustice screening on 17 November.
- On **JSNS.CZ**, we offer over 100 educational films, videos, and online games to the public free of charge.
- We participate in **expert discussions** on the future of the Czech education system.

For schools

- **Pupils:** we provide educational materials (handbooks, audiovisual lessons), organise online courses, run computer donation drives, organise school screenings of the One World Film Festival, and run student elections and debates with experts.
- **Teachers, headteachers, teaching assistants, school psychologists, prevention specialists:** we organise seminars and online courses, publish teaching and methodological materials, provide supervision, and offer consultations and support to entire schools.
- **School founders, professional communities, and Ministry of Education representatives:** we participate in working groups, provide feedback on legislative proposals, and advocate for systemic change.

For families with children and adolescents

- **Pre-schoolers and kindergarteners:** we prepare them for entry into nursery or primary school.
- **School-aged children:** we provide extra tuition, foster their motivation to learn, create an environment where they can succeed, help them choose a secondary school course, and prepare for entrance exams.
- **Adolescents:** we support them throughout their studies and as they prepare for their school-leaving exams; we help them cope with challenging situations and provide retro-scholarships.
- **Parents:** we strengthen their skills so they can support their children's education and communicate more effectively with their schools.

One World in Schools (OWIS) educational programme

Since 2001, we have contributed to the education of responsible and civically active young people. Audiovisual lessons from our JSNS.CZ portal are now part of the curriculum in more than ¾ of Czech primary and secondary schools. We are succeeding in improving the quality of education across the board and bringing about bottom-up systemic change.



We are seeing increased interest among teachers in values-based education

In 2025, the project Stories of Injustice celebrated its 20th anniversary. This project teaches modern Czechoslovak history and was a focal point of our activities.

To mark the 75th anniversary of the execution of Milada Horáková, we ran an exhibition called UndeclaredWomen. Through stories of women who demonstrated extraordinary courage and faithfulness to democratic principles and moral values—often at profound personal cost—UndeclaredWomen highlighted women’s resistance to totalitarianism.

UndeclaredWomen

In the last week of June, we organised an audiovisual exhibition in the arcade of Prague’s Lucerna Palace. The installation centred around two glass display cases. In one, an elegant ball gown rotated slowly; in the other, a prison uniform. This juxtaposition symbolised the sudden and drastic transformation in the lives of women who were imprisoned by the communist regime. Furthermore, the rotating motion emphasised the fact that life did not stand still, even in the dark days of oppression. Visitors, including schoolchildren and members of the public, learnt through specific stories how the state punished women for their loyalty to principles of democracy and morality.

The Month of Stories of Injustice

In November, over 600 schools, libraries, and other institutions took part in the 21st edition of the Month of Stories of Injustice, which , for the first time, featured a special programme for primary school pupils. They screened films about courageous women,

5,500 schools and other institutions participating in the OWIS programme.

173,000+ lessons viewed on JSNS.CZ.

78,365 people viewed One World Film Festival school screenings.

229 training events for 2,821 teachers, trainee teachers, and other educators.

664 schools registered for the Student Elections to the Chamber of Deputies and cast 90,820 votes.

600+ schools and other institutions took part in the Month of Stories of Injustice.

450+ schools and other institutions took part in Media Education Weeks.

organised discussions with eyewitnesses, filmmakers and experts on the subject, and displayed a poster version of the UndeclaredWomen exhibition on their premises.

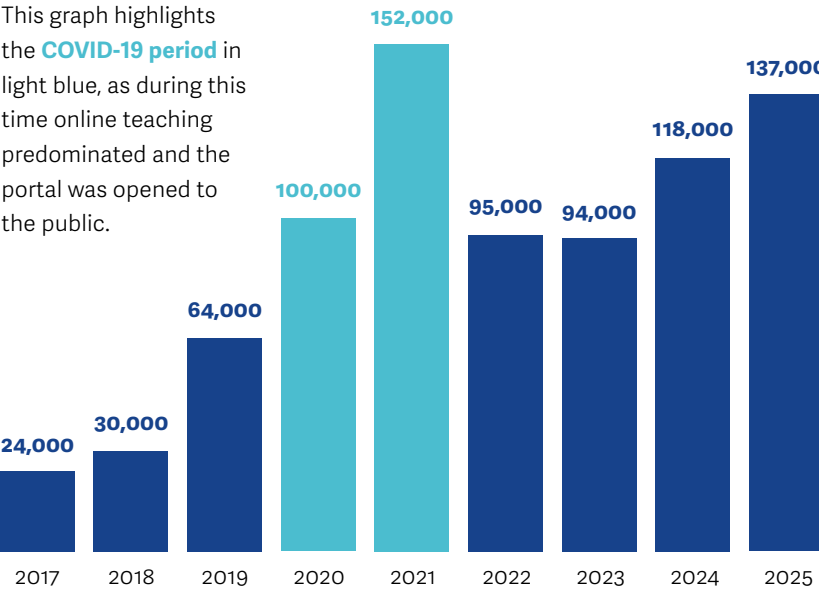
“Thank you very much for the opportunity to participate in the Month of Stories of Injustice. We set up the exhibition with the children in our school hall, and all of our secondary school pupils visited it. The children read the stories for themselves and shared what had caught their attention. With the year 9 pupils, we screened Jan Špáta’s film, The Greatest Wish. I used your methodology for the film screenings. This was followed by a discussion with a local eyewitness. With the younger children, I discussed heroism and we also watched an animated short about Milada Horáková. The whole thing was really meaningful and well put together; I’m glad we joined the project,”—a

teacher participating in the Month of Stories of Injustice.

Record interest from schools

2025 saw record-breaking interest in our other educational activities. This reflected the ongoing efforts of teachers to shape their pupils into responsible, informed, and critically thinking young people. In the spring, we recorded a 30% year-on-year increase in applications for school screenings as part of the One World Film Festival. There was also great interest in the Media Education Weeks programme, which also took place in Slovakia for the first time. The autumn Student Elections to the Chamber of Deputies also saw record participation, with half of all secondary schools in the Czech Republic taking part, more than half of which were vocational secondary schools and apprenticeship centres.

Support for education

Support both pre-schoolers and schoolchildren in their education and work to ensure that they progress beyond the end of compulsory schooling. We provide tuition, offer motivation, and collaborate with families and schools. We endeavour to contribute to systemic change.

More than **2,200** Czech children and young people have benefited from education with the extensive support of our seven regional branches.

We supported **520** students.

We helped a Year 2 student with maths and provided a scholarship to a trainee teacher

Last year, more than 2,200 Czech children and young people—including children from the Roma community—received our support for their education and personal growth in the Czech Republic. This resulted in improved grades, acceptance into secondary schools, and passing school-leaving, or university entrance exams. Other successes were noticeable: increased self-confidence, a more responsible attitude, and greater motivation to learn. Vaneska, a year 2 student, enjoys PE and English, but struggled with maths. Her mother was unable to help her at home and couldn't afford private tuition. We offered to help resolve these issues. Similarly, we supported 1,050 children and teenagers through tuition.

It can be hard to stay focused on a long course of study

Older children and adolescents often need support too. Some have a clear idea of where they're heading, but some come from difficult backgrounds where it can be extremely hard to stay focused on a long course of study. They need advice and help overcoming difficulties, which we provided to 520 students. Our retro-scholarships, funded by the Albatros Foundation, was also important in surmounting educational obstacles. For example, Josef, who completed his bachelor's degree in

teaching English and literature and is now continuing his master's degree with the support of a retro-scholarship.

Education: better jobs, higher incomes—a benefit for individuals, society, and the state

"Our aim is to ensure that children's success at school is not influenced by their socio-economic situation. We want children from low-income families to attain higher education, to find a good jobs, earn a decent living, and break the cycle of intergenerational poverty," says Adéla Pospíchalová, Head of Educational Services.

We supported 255 children in our pre-school clubs, and others through our outreach pre-school preparation programme.

As part of our Educational Support service, which includes the aforementioned tutoring and leisure-time educational activities, we work closely with parents and schools. In 2025, 380 volunteers helped us with this work.

We help students choose a course of study and prepare for entrance exams.

Social work with children and adolescents in our seven low-threshold clubs is also important, as is therapeutic mental health support (see pp. 52–53). We have also helped hundreds of Ukrainian children (see p. 55).

We provided tutoring and educational leisure activities for **1,050** children and adolescents.

Through a computer donation drive, we provided children and young people with **480** computers.

In addition to our scholarship programme, our support for young people includes help with choosing courses and schools, preparation for entrance and school-leaving exams, counselling, and educational events. Our computer donation drive from corporate donors is also a significant source of support; this enabled us to provide equipment and promote digital knowledge and skills.

We strive for systemic changes that reduce inequalities in education.

Another key initiative is the 'Menstrual Products for Schools' project (part of the 'Reproductive Health of Girls

and Women' programme), through which we have contributed to the widespread introduction of menstrual products in schools. To support this effort, we have developed lessons on menstruation for both girls and boys, as well as provided supporting materials for schools. We have supplemented school lessons with workshops, such as those promoting financial literacy. We are constantly engaged in advocacy work and strive for systemic changes to reduce inequalities in education, and we participate in a number of working groups and platforms.

Varianty Educational Programme

We organise courses and seminars for teachers and teaching assistants on inclusive education, global issues, and active citizenship. We support educators through regular supervision and we strive for systemic change. Quality education should not depend on luck or place of birth—it should be the standard for everyone.

Six of our Global Schools received an Inspiration Award from the Senate of the Parliament of the Czech Republic. “We are delighted when our support for teachers and students—in how to learn about and take an interest in global issues—translates into concrete activities. Through their work, their classmates, parents and residents of the towns and villages, are becoming familiar with global issues,” explains programme coordinator Zuzana Daubnerová.

We support, students, educators and schools through educational activities and supervision

Drawing on our first-hand experience of the various limitations of the education system, we contribute to changes that promote fairer and higher-quality education for all children. We participate in a range of working groups and expert panels concerning the education of disadvantaged children, the integration of Ukrainian students, and secondary school entrance examinations.

“In 2025, we provided supervision to teaching teams and individuals at more than 80 schools. In addressing a wide range of issues and challenges, we supported over 900 people—most on multiple occasions—through nearly 700 supervision sessions,” says Tomáš Habart, Head of the Varianty educational programme. Nearly half of these were teachers, a third were teaching assistants, and a tenth were school management.

We mainly focus on schools with a higher number of children from lower-income families and

Ukrainian refugees. Effective support provides a safe space for sharing, reflection, and problem solving.

“Supervision sessions are an excellent tool for teachers and headteachers, who deal with everything relating to students, relationships between teachers, and school management on a daily basis... your support is more than necessary,” —a participant in the supervision sessions.

We have 149 Global Schools

We have welcomed 12 new schools to the Global Schools programme, bringing the total number of schools to 149. Through this programme we collaborate with ARPOK and ADRA, and focus on supporting work on global issues. For example, students from Lidická Primary School in Bílina explored the protection of rainforests, the lives of indigenous communities, and the impacts of deforestation in the Amazon through their project ‘Rainbow Expedition’.



In 2025, we launched an online course to support the teaching of children with a different mother tongue in Czech schools. This is a response to the long-term presence of Ukrainian children in the country. The course outlines ways to help Ukrainian children engage effectively with lessons, their classes, and community.

Students raised enough money to buy a section of virgin forest. Students at St Ludmila Primary School in Opava were inspired by the plight of a Ukrainian classmate’s brother, who has been held captive in Russia for three years. Their project, ‘Kindness for Peace’, included providing practical aid to Ukraine.

We launched another online course for teachers

We organised dozens of seminars on our tried-and-tested methods, such as Philosophy for Children and Persona Dolls. We have launched a new online course to support the teaching of children with a different mother tongue. This year, we held the 8th annual ‘With Assistants Towards a Better School’ conference. This was attended by nearly two hundred participants, including the Roman Catholic priest

and educator Marek Orko Vácha, who focused on topics such as ethical challenges in education and the need to build resilience.

“You create with words. When you find, recognise, and appreciate the good in the people around you, that is perhaps the best thing you can do as teachers,” he said at the conference.

Training future journalists

In collaboration with the Institute of Communication Studies and Journalism at the Faculty of Social Sciences, Charles University, we ran two courses on ‘Media and Migration’ for journalism students.

We also prepared a follow-up to the online course for teachers, The Labyrinth of Migration, and a series of lectures for the Global Health course at the Second Faculty of Medicine, Charles University.

A festival in
challenging
times



The 27th edition of the One World International Human Rights Film Festival took place at a time when the protection of human rights and global justice are under threat from changes to the existing geopolitical order.

International organisations and institutions supported by the global community play a key role in monitoring and defending human rights. However, we are increasingly witnessing their authority being undermined, thereby trivialising the suffering of people in areas of conflict. One World has always provided—and will continue to provide—first-hand accounts of those at the forefront of human rights. Such accounts enable people to form their own opinions and to refute the proliferation of disinformation and politically motivated lies.

It is our duty to ensure the festival is accessible and open to everyone, regardless of their background, education, or other privileges. One World Film Festival is a public forum where people are equal in their access to information and where every voice carries weight, regardless of its origin.

We are therefore delighted that, in 2025, the festival visited a record 57 towns and cities across the Czech Republic, running from 12 March to 27 April. The films and the debates that followed have reached the widest audience to date. We were deeply moved by the shared gatherings and the exchange of powerful experiences, concerns, surprises, and inspiration.

One World 2025:
Record attendance and
global acclaim

The 27th edition of the One World Film Festival reaffirmed its pre-eminent position not only as the world’s largest human rights film festival, but also as a vibrant platform connecting Czech audiences with pressing stories from around the globe. In 2025, the festival expanded to a record 57 cities and attracted over 122,000 filmgoers, proving that the need to share powerful experiences in cinemas and to debate human rights continues to grow.

Slovakia at the heart of the dialogue
Slovakia became a key thematic and social focus of this year’s festival. Even before the festival began, the ‘Benefit for Slovakia’ concert drew attention to the situation in our

neighbouring country, and in support of the ‘Open Culture’ platform. The ‘Slovak Journey’ programme section then offered a comprehensive view of political and social developments in the country.

Films that shift perspectives
The programme featured 104 films; among the most notable titles were Mr Nobody vs Putin, directed by David Borenstein and Pavel Talankin, and The Other One, directed by Marie-Magdalena Kochová. Both films became audience sensations. During the festival, they were screened in more than 30 towns and cities across the Czech Republic, confirming the high curatorial quality of the programme.

Floods in Northern Moravia and Silesia

691 households received support for new boilers and heating systems.

4,750 tonnes of firewood, briquettes, and pellets were distributed to affected households.

Flood Relief Continues

In September 2024, devastating floods struck Northern Moravia and Silesia, leaving 13 people dead, over 5,500 homes and apartments damaged, and material destruction amounting to almost € 2.9 billion. Our team responded immediately by launching the SOS Floods which raised € 21.3 million thanks to contributions from over 127,000 individuals and company donors. Within a matter of days, we reached the hardest-hit areas of the Olomouc and Moravian-Silesian regions. In the initial phase, we worked alongside the Integrated Rescue System to help the Jeseník region that was completely cut off. Our operations then focused primarily on the Jeseník, Krnov, and Opava regions, where we coordinated aid with

our partners at Charita Opava. By the end of 2024, we distributed material aid worth over € 370,000 and delivered direct financial assistance to over 3,646 flooded households. In total, we provided aid in 61 municipalities across 6 regions.

2025: Warmth for Winter and New Housing Beyond Flood Zones

During the winter of 2024 and 2025, we provided financial contributions to 691 households to repair boilers and heating systems, while simultaneously distributing over 4,750 tonnes of solid fuel (firewood, briquettes, and pellets) in affected municipalities where the floods had swept away households' winter supplies. In the spring, together with other organisations and small business

5 partner organisations provided psychological support to more than 3,000 people.

We helped 82 families secure new housing.

owners, we helped 46 households strip plaster and carry out construction work to speed up the drying process in their homes. Local residents still continue to struggle with post-traumatic stress. Therefore, we supported a network of five partner organisations providing professional support to more than 3,000 children and adults. The core of our work in 2025 was to help those families whose homes were damaged or destroyed or subject to a demolition order. In cooperation with Local Action Groups and municipal leadership, we helped to process documentation and submit applications to the Ministry for Regional Development's "Živel 3" subsidy programme. In total, we helped to secure and co-finance new housing for 82 families, 48 of whom faced demolitions. About half of those we assisted with purchasing or building new homes completely

outside of the flood-prone areas. One family we supported was the Trnčák family. "The shock came after the water receded, when we could literally see right through the house. The structural engineer's decision was clear: demolition," describes Mrs Trnčáková, who subsequently bought an old house from her family. Because of this, however, she was ineligible for the state programme "Živel 3". "Then I got a phone call from an employee at People in Need, and everything started moving forward with incredible motivation and drive. We received insurance information, a preliminary project design, and an estimate for the renovation. She ran everything through the approval process and called me with wonderful news: it's approved." The amount of financial donation varied based on each family's socioeconomic situation and the severity of the damage, averaging around € 45,000 per family.

In the turbulent year of 2025, we helped people to find solutions to their problems within a broader context, be it slow-onset phenomena such as landscape drought and agricultural soil degradation, or managing consequences of natural disasters such as floods.

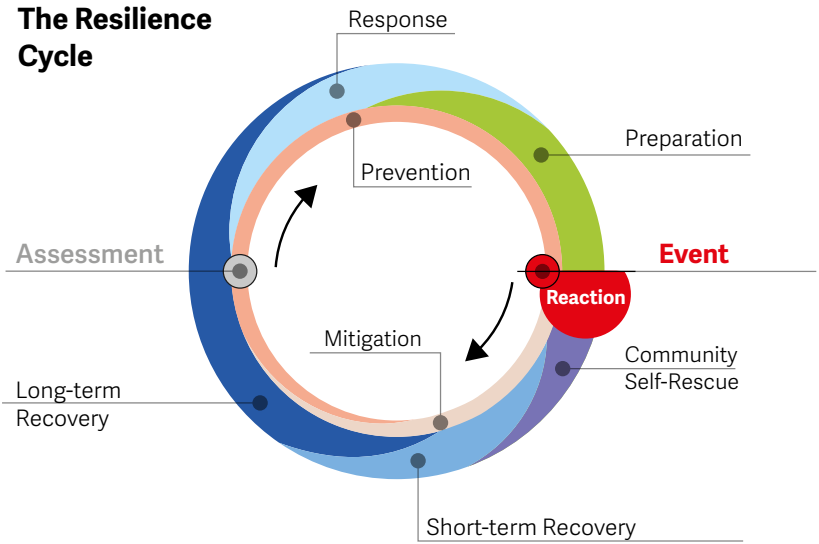
Our work was always guided by an overarching principle of a recovery cycle (see diagram), which helps to transform crises into opportunities for change and strengthens resilience of both the landscape and its inhabitants.

Thanks to our institutional and private donors, we were able to focus on evaluating root causes, analysing landscape vulnerabilities, supporting long-term planning and preventive measures in municipalities, strengthening community relations, and supporting children's education and their connection to nature.

Building Resilience

We Listen, We Ask, We Collaborate

The path to successfully achieving a more resilient landscape in cooperation of state agencies, local governments, experts, scientists, teachers, farmers, landowners, and local residents and community groups. As such, we organised a round table of stakeholders in January to identify barriers to effective disaster recovery and opportunities to achieve better health and safety of the region and its citizens.

A natural disaster a turning point upon which the future of the landscape and its people is decided. True resilience is built during periods between crises. This is why we support mayors and representatives of affected municipalities to map out and plan how to restore a river, so that it causes less damage during the next flood. As our experts teach in our courses, healthy soil can absorb incomparably more water than fields degraded by large-scale agriculture. Through a new landscape health index we provide citizens with data relevant for their region so they better understand their surroundings and which parts are the most vulnerable. Education is equally important to us.

Through our Learning about Climate platform (Učím o klimatu), we support educators and youth in designing their own projects that will transform the environment near their homes. The most significant developments happen between disasters: solutions are found, and people come together, forming lasting connections. Scientists, journalists, landscape architects, and locals sit at round tables to discuss the safety procedures of municipalities long after the heavy machinery has left. It is this tireless groundwork, combining recovery processes with prevention plans, that helps us be better prepared for the next time.

Building Landscape Resilience

In the LIFE WILL project, we continued to prepare the selected adaptation measures in pilot municipalities and provide expert consultations to local governments. The list of successful activities is long and diverse: In February, we launched a second round of training for newly participating towns and villages. In May, we held a round table in Mělník with 47 municipal representatives, state institutions, and expert organisations, to discuss how to facilitate building resilient landscapes. In autumn, we dedicated excursions to good practice sharing and organised meetings with mayors and agricultural experts in the Cecemínsko region. We concluded the year’s activities with planting trees in Němčice. In addition, we published a series of newsletters and articles focusing on subsidies, adaptation strategies, landscape features, and lease agreements. In South Moravia, we continued to support municipalities hit by the devastating tornado and flash floods, utilising

finance from our SOS Moravia appeal. In addition, thanks to the international project EUKI ELCA, we finalised three of the six Climate Action Plans in the region for the municipalities of Hodonín, Moravská Nová Ves, and Prušánky. In cooperation with our project partners, we trained 10 climate managers and shared experiences across Europe. Together with the city of Hodonín and climate managers, we organised a month of climate activities and a two-day climate conference that connected 90 municipal representatives, experts, institutions, and the public. Through our educational courses, 70 participants learned about wetlands, agroforestry, and anti-erosion measures. We continued to build a network of sustainable agriculture consultants. Thanks to our new website klima.clovekvtisni.cz/en/, we offer a library of best practices and have updated our landscape health index, a digital database on which anyone can see and explore the landscape health of the area where they live.

Climate Education In and Outside Schools

To ensure that children and students understand climate change, teachers must have high-quality tools. Our educational portal Learning about Climate (Učím o klimatu) was completely redesigned and expanded with 140 new lessons, articles, and other support materials. We also launched an educational portal udrzitelnysvet.online (SustainableWorld.online) featuring two new courses for schools and the public. These courses were launched in 2025 and attracted 1,090 users. In our long-term programmes, we trained 36 educators who went on to create new lesson plans and implemented school climate projects. Our communication campaign on social media reached half a million people and boosted public interest in climate education. In Northern Moravia and Silesia, we continued to help municipalities affected by floods, thanks to the SOS Floods fund. We are currently working with 19 of these municipalities on disaster-mitigation projects, which ensure that renovations are carried

out following the “Build back better” principle. For instance, we support landscape retention capacity and watercourse revitalisation in the Bělá pod Pradědem, Vápenná, and Mikulovice municipalities. We also organised expert teams reconnaissance (architects, hydrologists, and landscape ecologists) to the affected municipalities to speed up recovery planning.

How We Talk About Climate in Public Space

Climate change is not only a technical issue; it is also about emotions, communication, and public understanding. That is why we organised workshops for dozens of journalists. We want to help them communicate climate topics clearly and avoid common misconceptions. In Jeseník, we held a conference entitled, Water Pathways, and we also participated as a partner in the European research project, Horizon CIDAPE. Its results can help improve public communication regarding climate measures. In cooperation with Czech Radio, we continued producing the podcast “Voices of Change” (Hlasy proměny), which released its second six-part series.

competence of other bodies and to serve as an
advisory body to the Chief Executive Officer.
The Executive Committee also ensures that
management is informed about the activities
of individual sections and discusses issues that
may affect the organisation as a whole.

The Chief Executive Officer is the statutory
body of the organisation that manages its
activities and acts on its behalf. The Chief
Executive Officer is appointed and dismissed by
the Board of Trustees, which also determines
the terms and conditions of the performance of
this function, including remuneration.

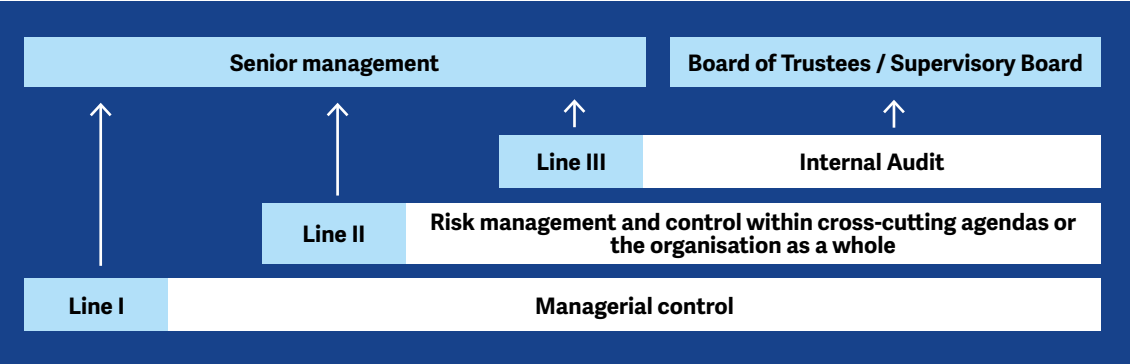
Control and Risk Management

Throughout the organisation, we deal with risks on an ongoing basis—from identifying them to striving to prevent them in the future.

Risk management cycle

For every project, we identify risks that could jeopardise its implementation. We analyse their possible causes, likelihood, and impact on the project’s objectives and the organisation as a whole. We assess severity and minimise impact by adjusting projects, strengthening control or safety measures, and so on. We continuously monitor and review both the risks and the effectiveness of the measures. We then use the insights gained when planning further activities.

It also addressed a cross-cutting process review of the social and educational programmes branch in the Czech Republic and selected country programmes.

We undergo dozens of checks and audits

Independent audits and inspections regularly verify whether we are using funds from subsidies and grants for their intended purposes and in accordance with relevant rules. At the same time, the audits monitor whether we are fulfilling our project commitments and that our financial and management processes are functioning correctly.

- **A statutory audit** has been conducted annually since 1997 and is linked to the financial year. It confirms the accuracy of the financial statements, mandatory annexes, and information in the annual report. The audit is carried out by Audit Servis, s.r.o.
- **Funding from Czech public budgets and operational programmes** is subject to audits and inspections by the respective funding authorities, regional authorities, and the Tax Office for the Capital City of Prague. In 2025, nine external inspections and audits were carried out in the area of social and educational services, focusing on financial management and compliance with project commitments. In addition, we successfully underwent eight regional methodological inspections focusing on service standards, methodological guidelines, operational procedures, and established practice in the provision of social services in accordance with Act No. 108/2006 Coll.
- **Public appeals** are monitored by the Prague City Hall. This monitoring takes the form of regular reports in which we itemise how much funding we have raised, how it has been used, and to which specific activities it has contributed.
- **Grants** from the European Commission and other foreign bodies are subject to substantive and financial audits, both at the individual project level and the entire organisation. In 2025, we successfully passed over a hundred audits at our headquarters and in our country programmes. We work with renowned audit firms such as Deloitte, Ernst & Young, BDO, and others.
- We also undergo **process audits and comprehensive system audits**, some of which build on previous project audits. In 2025, Ernst & Young conducted an audit, during which they examined all projects funded from US federal sources in the previous year. We also underwent organisation-wide audits initiated by the European Commission and other international institutional donors. These in-depth audits assess not only specific projects but also the overall structure of our operations. In 2025, they accounted for roughly a third of all audits.

Cybersecurity and Data Protection

The Five Pillars of Our Cybersecurity Strategy

1. **Governance:** We ensure systematic information security management through internal processes, standardised procedures, policies, and staff training. We also deploy modern device management tools.
2. **Data Leak Prevention:** We implement organisational and technical measures to protect sensitive information, particularly high-impact data.
3. **User awareness:** We strengthen cybersecurity awareness through regular training, campaigns, and practical exercises.
4. **Reducing outages:** We implement and test measures to minimise disruption to critical IT systems, supported by alternative infrastructure and communication channels.
5. **External cooperation:** We build trusted partnerships with professional bodies that bring expert know-how at low cost. We also share our expert know-how through initiatives such as NetHope working groups.

We successfully passed the Cyber Essentials Plus audit in 2025.

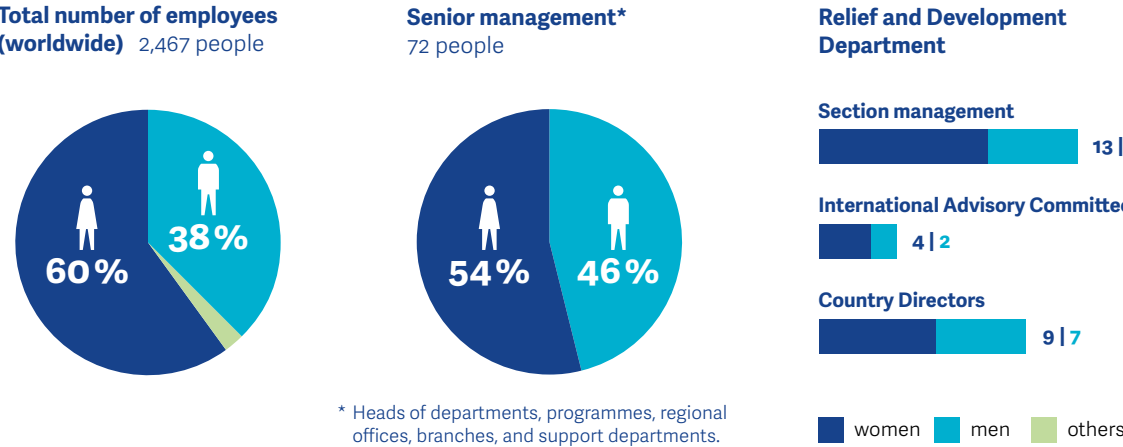

Ethical guidelines and standards

Our ethics stem from shared values, day-to-day decisions, and the way we treat people. However, for an organisation with thousands of employees worldwide, written standards are essential; employees are made aware of these upon joining and they are available to them at any time. An overview of these is provided below.

	People in Need's Code of Conduct	This is a core policy and it is binding on all employees and collaborators. It covers child safeguarding, prevention of discrimination and harassment, anti-corruption, conflicts of interest, responsible use of organisational resources, and workplace safety.
	Conflict of Interest	The policy covers conflicts between personal interests and professional responsibilities. Staff must disclose them promptly.
	Responsible Use of Resources	We have zero tolerance for corruption and fraud. Staff must use organisational resources responsibly, refuse bribes, and report suspected misconduct.
	Safeguarding	Clear policies and regular training help prevent exploitation, abuse, harassment, and bullying. At PIN, everyone has access to safe reporting channels.
	Equal Opportunities and Inclusion	We promote equal opportunities regardless of gender, age, disability, or background, supported by training, accessible communication, and safe reporting channels.
	Responsible Partnerships	We partner only with organisations that share our values and respect human rights. We assess reputational, social, and environmental risks, and end partnerships where necessary.
	Prevention of terrorist financing	We screen partners, suppliers, and funding recipients against international sanctions lists to ensure our funds never support terrorism or violence.

Feedback

We have established feedback and reporting mechanisms across our operations in the Czech Republic and abroad, available to staff, clients, and partners.

- 
 - **Routine concerns**, such as workplace disputes, suggestions regarding work organisation or workplace relations, are dealt with by line managers or the HR department.
 - **Serious breaches**, such as discrimination, harassment, or corruption, are dealt with via the internal whistleblowing system; abroad, employees can contact a designated focal point.

All reports are reviewed impartially, with due regard for confidentiality and the protection of everyone involved.

Environmental responsibility

We are fully aware of our responsibility towards the environment, and we actively limit our environmental impact. We use sustainability measures to protect nature and conserve resources, recognising that meaningful environmental progress requires consistent, deliberate action.



Energy Efficiency

We practice energy efficiency by reducing unnecessary consumption, optimising heating and cooling, and using smart heating controls. We also use energy-efficient lighting and appliances and switch to renewable energy where feasible.



Water Efficiency

We reduce water consumption through water-efficient fixtures, including low-flow taps. Some country programmes also harvest rainwater to conserve local water resources.



Waste Management

We prioritise waste reduction through low-waste and bulk purchasing, avoid single-use tableware at events, and adapt waste management to local conditions wherever we work.



Sustainable Travel

We travel only when necessary, favour lower-carbon transport where possible, offset unavoidable flight emissions, and promote sustainable travel where local conditions and security allow. We also encourage cycling.



Sustainable Procurement

We consider environmental impacts when selecting suppliers and products. Energy efficiency, waste generation, and environmental certifications are also considered in procurement processes.

Making our financial information accessible



Our annual report’s financial section is primarily intended to be as informative and transparent as possible. However, focusing on numbers can make it less engaging or more difficult to read. That is why, for many years now, we have included not only the mandatory components of the financial statements—namely, the Financial Statements themselves, the Notes to the Financial Statements, the Cash flow statement, and, of course, the Independent auditor’s report—but also financial overviews designed to help answer two simple questions: where do we get our funding from, and how do we use these funds? In this way, we hope to be comprehensible and transparent to all, even to those without accounting expertise.

Furthermore, financial reporting incorporates two perspectives. The first, the cash (source) perspective, shows how much funding we received during the year. The second, the accounting (accrual), shows how much we spent during the year. These two perspectives follow different logics and cannot be fully reconciled. Therefore, for 2025, we have made minor changes to the reporting of financial donations and income from Czech foundations. We have moved the list of donors a few pages forward to the fundraising section (pp. 88–89), where donations are listed as they were received, i.e. in their full amount. In the financial section a revenue table records donations listed in aggregate, representing the portion of donations used during the year. In addition, we have raised the disclosure threshold in all tables to CZK 200,000 to improve the readability of the overviews. Naturally, in all disclosures of donors, we comply with GDPR rules.

These minor changes should help readers better navigate the data presented.

Revenues 2025

This overview shows the organisation's revenue in 2025. For grants, subsidies, and donations, this is the amount of funds used in the year 2025. According to the binding methodology, People in Need accounts for these funds on a fund basis, i.e. the funds received are first booked to the Fund and are only reclassified to Revenue when they are used (drawn down) in a given year. Therefore, funds retained in the Fund for use in future years will not appear in the current year's revenue. Conversely, funds received in previous years that have been spent in the current year will appear in the table. For conversion to EUR, we use the exchange rate published by the Czech National Bank on 31 December 2025 (CZK 24.245 per EUR).

The threshold for disclosure in this overview is CZK 200,000 (approx. EUR 8,249). Revenues lower than CZK 200,000 are combined in line “Other” in individual categories.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR ´S REPORT

Opinion
We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Company Člověk v tísni, o.p.s. (PEOPLE IN NEED), prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the Czech Republic, which comprise the balance sheet as of 31 December 2025, the profit and loss account from 1 January 2025 to 31 December 2025, and cash flow statement for the period from 1 January 2025 to 31 December 2025, and notes to the financial statements (hereinafter referred to as "financial statements"), including material accounting policy information. In preparing the financial statements, the statutory body of the Company Člověk v tísni, o. p. s. (PEOPLE IN NEED) is responsible for assessing the company´s ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the statutory body either intends to liquidate the Company Člověk v tísni, o. p. s. (PEOPLE IN NEED) or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

The supervisory board is responsible for the supervision of the Company’s financial reporting process.

Auditor´s Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor’s report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with above mentioned regulations will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

- As part of an audit in accordance with the above law or regulation, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting



a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

- Conclude on the appropriateness of the statutory body´s use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Company Člověk v tísni, o. p. s. (PEOPLE IN NEED) to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor’s report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor’s report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Company Člověk v tísni, o. p. s. (PEOPLE IN NEED) to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the notes to the financial statements, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with the statutory body and supervisory board, regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

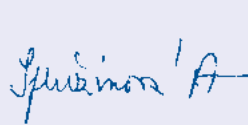

3. Information on used accounting methods and general accounting principles

The Organisation processes its accounting records using computer equipment utilising Microsoft Dynamics NAV 2018 software with the required modifications for the Organisation's needs. Aricoma Systems a.s made the custom adjustments.
Accounting documents are archived as hard copies in the archive at the Organisation's registered office, Šafaříkova 24, 120 00 Praha 2 and partly in the property owned by the Organisation – Hartigova 182/1945, Praha 3.
At the missions abroad, where the local legislation requires the archiving of accounting documents in the country of origin, these accounting documents are archived in local archives at the registered offices of foreign branches of the Organisation. Accounting records are also filed electronically on a separate server and simultaneously on an external storage medium deposited outside the Organisation's operating premises. The DMS system ELO has been used for archiving documents since 2011.

The Organisation maintains its accounting according to Accounting Act no. 563/1991 Coll., as amended, and according to Regulation no. 504/2002 Coll. as amended (hereinafter referred to as the "accounting principles").

3. 1. Tangible and intangible fixed assets

Tangible and intangible fixed assets are assets with a useable life exceeding one year and starting from the following valuation limit:

Buildings, land, and artworks are considered tangible fixed assets regardless of the purchase price and usable life.
Long-term financial assets are assets with a due period longer than one year, regardless of evaluation.
Fixed assets are valued based on the purchase cost, i.e., secondary acquisition costs (cost of transport, installation, etc.) or replacement costs (assets acquired free of charge).
Depreciation of tangible and intangible fixed assets is regulated by the depreciation plan. The Organisation applies the straight-line method of depreciation. Unless stipulated otherwise in individual cases, the period of depreciation of fixed assets is based on the table below:

Minor intangible and tangible fixed assets acquired by 31 December 2002 have been recorded in the Organisation's assets and valued at the purchase cost. These assets are registered in asset accounts until their retirement.

The assets acquired after 1 January 2003, that are below the above-given valuation limit and with a usable life longer than 1 year are reflected in the Organisation's expenses at the time of acquisition. However, these assets are registered during the whole period of use in the operational inventory records and are subject to inventory.

In the case of posting the depreciation of assets acquired from subsidies and grants or donated assets against the accumulated depreciation account, the amount of equity will decrease by the depreciation amount, and the other revenues account will increase at the same time.

3. 2. Inventories

The purchased inventory is valued at the purchase cost, which includes the cost of purchase of inventory and costs related to the purchase.

Own products are valued at their own costs (i.e. direct expenses and the part of indirect expenses related to the production).

Finished products and goods purchased for resale are recorded in a separate SW Navision module.

Inventory received free of charge and intended for humanitarian and development aid is registered in the operational records or in the register in a separate module of SW Navision.

3. 3. Cash and valuables

Cash and valuables are valued at their respective nominal values.

For funds received from collections and grants, separate bank accounts are opened in which these resources are recorded and reported.

3. 4. Receivables

Receivables are valued at their initial nominal value. The Organisation does not have receivables transferred from other entities.

3. 5. Payables

Payables are valued at their initial nominal value. The Organisation has not assumed any payables of other entities.

3. 6. Use of foreign currency in accounting

3. 6. 1. Use of foreign currency in the course of the accounting period

During the accounting period, receivables and payables recorded in foreign currencies declared by ČNB (Czech National Bank) are converted into the Czech currency at the ČNB exchange rate declared on the first day of the calendar month after 2:30 p.m. On the first working day of the month, by the declaration of the exchange rate at 2:30 p.m., the exchange rate of the previous month is used.

Receivables, payables, subsidies, and grants according to indent 3. 7. that are recorded in other currencies not declared by ČNB were converted to Czech currency at the official middle exchange rate declared by the central bank of that respective country or the current interbank exchange rate to USD or EUR.

In countries where there is no central bank, an exchange rate that ensures the true and fair view of accounting is used.

3. 6. 2. Use of foreign currency at the end of the balance sheet date

At the end of the accounting period, receivables and payables recorded in foreign currencies declared by ČNB (Czech National Bank) are converted into Czech currency at the ČNB exchange rate declared on 31 December 2025.

Receivables, payables, subsidies, and grants according to indent 3. 7. that are recorded in other currencies not declared by ČNB were converted to Czech currency at the official middle exchange rate declared by the central bank of that respective country or the current interbank exchange rate to USD or EUR.

In countries where there is no central bank, an exchange rate that ensures the true and fair view of accounting is used.

3. 7. Funds and equity

In compliance with the relevant accounting principles, there are posted items concerning public collections announced pursuant to Act no. 117/2001 Coll., funds received by the Organisation from other persons and companies for the purpose of implementation of the Organisation's primary mission: subsidies, gifts, grants, reserve fund, and operating reserve fund, in the funds.

In the equity accounts, the Organisation accounts for assets acquired from subsidies, grants, donated assets, and materials. The balance also includes financial results up to 2003.

A list of important donors is part of the Organisation's annual report.

- 1/ The Organisation categorises funds as restricted and unrestricted:
- Restricted funds are funds used primarily in terms of purpose and conditions set by the provider or by other legislation.

– Unrestricted funds are funds used at PIN's discretion and either not covered by any other legislation or covered only very generally.

- 2/ The Organisation also records received subsidies and grants by currency and by the conversion rate determined by the provider:
- a/ Subsidies and grants that are settled with the provider in foreign currency by rates that the Organisation uses during the reporting period.

b/ Subsidies and grants that are settled with the provider at the rate set by the provider.

c/ Other subsidies and grants that are recorded in the Czech currency.

The Organisation opened synthetic accounts 914 (funds – assets under construction) and 919 (funds – inventory in transit) in the account classification within account group 91 (funds). In account 914, part of the financial resources of funds for the coverage of assets under construction as of 31 December 2025, are reported; in account 919, part of the financial resources of funds allocated for the coverage of purchased inventories and inventories in transit as of 31 December 2025, is reported. Drawdown (settlement) of funds reported in accounts 914 and 919 will be made in the next accounting period upon the physical handover of inventories or completion of assets in compliance with the respective contracts.

On 20 September 2012, the Organisation's Board of Trustees established an operating reserves fund. The fund consists of net profit after tax based on the decision of the Board of Trustees on accounting of the profit. Resources from the fund are used for the co-financing of projects if the operating result is a loss that cannot be covered by the project resources or for the Organisation's stability, sustainability, and development. The operating reserves fund is recorded in account 917.

The Organisation's financial result for 2025 is an accounting profit of CZK 2,745 thousand (after tax).

In compliance with Act no. 248/1995 Coll. on Public Benefit Organisations, expenses and revenues related to the administration of a public benefit organisation are recorded in the Organisation's accounting separately broken down by centres.

9. Profit and loss account – expenses

Item A. I. 6. "Other services" with a value of CZK 919,859 thousand mainly includes the costs of purchases from services suppliers within the realisation of projects (mostly abroad), focusing on the promotion of education and healthcare, social services, increasing access to water and improving sanitary conditions, securing livelihoods, poverty reduction and environmental protection, and the costs of office rental and operation.

Item A. V. 20. "Donations to recipients" valued at CZK 1,367,282 thousand, includes financial donations and donated material provided as humanitarian and development aid, mainly in Ukraine, Syria, Ethiopia, Moldova, DR Congo, Afghanistan, and other countries. Financial contributions and donated materials were used to provide assistance to refugees and their families; securing accommodation, food, water, hygiene kits and equipment for refugee centres, inhabitants in war zones and internally displaced people.. In 2025, Financial and material donations in the amount of CZK 129,149 thousand were donated to victims of the 2024 floods (citizens, municipalities, and public institutions) in the Moravian-Silesian and Olomouc regions.

Item A. V. 21. "Shortages and damage" in a value of CZK 22,996 thousand includes inventories destroyed by a fire in the logistics complex in Dnipro, Ukraine in September 2025. The fire completely destroyed the People in Need warehouse with an approximate area of 8,000 m2. The fire was not caused by the Organisation; it started in a neighbouring building within a large warehouse complex where several entities operate. The fire quickly spread to the People in Need warehouse, which primarily stored fuel briquettes and other materials intended for winter humanitarian aid. Firefighters and local police responded immediately. The relevant Ukrainian authorities have taken over the investigation of the incident, and as of the date of this report, no party has been identified as responsible. The cause of the fire remains under investigation. The fire destroyed all supplies stored in the warehouse, including more than 1,190 tonnes of fuel briquettes intended for winter support to households in eastern and southern Ukraine, hygiene kits, drinking water supplies, construction materials for emergency home repairs, and other humanitarian items. Two forklifts and other warehouse equipment, including computer equipment, were also destroyed in the fire. The affected supplies were primarily intended to support residents of the Kharkiv, Zaporizhzhia, Kherson, and Donetsk oblasts. Although

the incident represented a significant loss for the ongoing winter aid programme, the organisation immediately took steps to restore supplies so that support for the most vulnerable households would not be interrupted.

Item A. V. 22. "Other expenses" in a value of CZK 376,946 thousand includes mainly costs of partners spent during the implementation of joint projects via "partnership agreement".

10. Profit and loss account – revenues

Item B. IV. 8. "Foreign exchange gains" with a value of CZK 127,133 thousand includes foreign exchange gains arising mainly from fund revaluation and revaluation of short-term financial assets registered in foreign currency (cash and banks).

Item B. IV. 9. "Accounting for funds" with a value of CZK 3,545,541 thousand includes revenues associated with the use of the funds reported in the balance sheet under liabilities and equity item A. I. 2. "Funds" on the main activities of the Organisation.

Item B. IV. 10. "Other revenues" in a value of CZK 323,390 thousand relates to the main activities of the Organisation. This item mainly includes revenue estimates for outstanding grants that the Organisation benefited from a valid contract in 2025. The funds from the donor have not been paid by the date of the drawing up of the financial statements. There are also contracted and received incomes in the next accounting period for projects already partially implemented in 2025.

11. Remuneration for audit company

The remuneration of CZK 700 thousand excl. VAT belongs to the audit company for the statutory audit of the annual financial statements for 2025. CZK 429 thousand excl. VAT was invoiced in 2025 for other verification services.

12. Other important facts

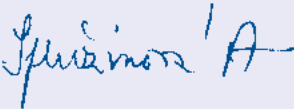
The Organisation concluded an overdraft credit contract with Československá obchodní banka a.s. on 24 November 2017–the current credit limit of CZK 35,000 thousand is valid from October 23, 2020.

The credit was not drawn as of the balance sheet date. Following this contract, a pledge agreement was concluded on 27 November 2017. The subject of the collateral is real estate listed in the property sheet LV 239, cadastral area Žižkov, Prague.

Other Organisation's assets are not encumbered with any lien. The Organisation does not register any other payables not included in the financial statements or Notes to the financial statements.

No other events occurred after the balance sheet date and by the date of drawing up the financial statements that would significantly affect the reported values of assets and liabilities, the financial situation, and the financial result of the Organisation in the financial statements as of 31 December 2025.
